Information about this children's home

- The home provides care for up to four children who may have emotional and/or behavioural difficulties.
- The home is operated by a private provider who has three other children's homes in the area.
- The registered manager has been registered with Ofsted since December 2016.

This monitoring visit

This children's home was judged inadequate at the full inspection in June 2018.

At that inspection, safeguarding arrangements were inadequate, staff were not managing children's high-risk behaviours effectively and three out of the four children living in the home were making insufficient progress. The inspector also found one child's bedroom to be in an unacceptable state; it was unclean and unkempt. Eleven statutory requirements were issued.

The purpose of this monitoring visit was to review the actions taken by leaders and managers to improve the quality of care provided to children and to assess the progress made towards meeting the requirements.

At this monitoring visit, inspectors found that practices in the home had declined. Children are not being kept safe because leaders, managers and staff are failing to protect them from the risk of harm and from actual harm.

Although the home is being redecorated, insufficient action has been taken to clean and tidy children's bedrooms and keep them clean and tidy. Children are still allowed to live in bedrooms that are unclean, disorganised and unsafe. Children's clothing is left on the floor and there is evidence of children regularly smoking and misusing

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substances in their rooms. This poor practice is neglectful, it shows that staff are not meeting children's basic care needs and does not demonstrate care and nurture of children.

Staff are not managing medication safely. Staff did not know the possible implications of a medication that a child was taking and had no system in place to monitor the child for side-effects or changes in behaviour. In addition, prescription-only medication was found by inspectors in a child's bedroom, despite it not being prescribed to this child. Staff do not know how it came to be in the child's possession and took no action to remove it themselves.

Staff are failing to safeguard the children from incidents and relationships that place them at risk of harm to their welfare. Staff are not taking sufficient action to protect a child who often stays away from the home, and neither did they respond effectively when two other children went missing together, resulting in them being exploited. Leaders and managers did not take action to protect a child who made an allegation about an adult that supports her.

A decision was made to suspend the registration of the home with immediate effect on 8 August 2018.

- help each child to develop and practise skills to resolve conflicts positively and without harm to anyone;
- communicate to each child expectations about the child's behaviour and ensure that the child understands those expectations in accordance with the child's age and understanding;
- help each child to develop the understanding and skills to recognise or withdraw from a damaging, exploitative or harmful relationship;
- understand how children's previous experiences and present emotions can be communicated through behaviour and have the competence and skills to interpret these and develop positive relationships with children;
- are provided with supervision and support to enable them to understand and manage their own feelings and responses to the behaviour and emotions of children, and to help children to do the same.

- assess whether each child is at risk of harm, taking into account information in the child's relevant plans, and, if necessary, make arrangements to reduce the risk of any harm to the child;
- help each child to understand how to keep safe;
- have the skills to identify and act upon signs that a child is at risk of harm;
- understand the roles and responsibilities in relation to protecting children that are assigned to them by the registered person;
