Overall outcome

The school meets all of the independent school standards that were checked during this inspection

Main inspection findings

Part 3. Welfare, health and safety of pupils

Paragraph 7, 7(a), 7(b), 16, 16(a), 16(b)

- The standard inspection of June 2017 identified that the school's arrangements for safeguarding were not effective. This was because the culture of safeguarding was weak. Leaders did not have a secure understanding of how effectively statutory guidance was being implemented. They had not ensured that the school's safeguarding policy was well understood and fully implemented by staff.
- At the time of this inspection, the school's safeguarding policy was evaluated and found to conform to the most recent government legislation. The policy was appropriate to ensure the safety of pupils. The safeguarding policy is reviewed annually and is available on the school's website.
- Staff have a good understanding of the school's safeguarding policies and procedures. All staff are expected to read documentation and adhere fully to the requirements laid out. Induction procedures ensure that new staff are given appropriate training to enable them to carry out their roles and responsibilities effectively. In discussions, staff demonstrated a good understanding of the actions to take should they have any concerns regards the safety or welfare of a pupil, for example pupils at risk of child sexual exploitation or radicalisation and extremism.
- Leaders have put in place a risk assessment policy which has been implemented across the school. Risk assessments are in place for individual pupils and for planned activities. These are checked by leaders to ensure that they are fit for purpose. Nonetheless, leaders know that the quality of risk assessments needs further work to ensure that they are incisive and identify the precise risk to individual pupils.
- Leaders' increased focus on improving the school's policies and procedures since the previous standard inspection has resulted in a stronger culture of safeguarding to minimise risks to pupils and to keep them safe from harm.
- The standards in paragraph 7 and paragraph 16 are now met.



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Part 6. Provision of information

Paragraph 32(1), 32(1)(f), 32(2), 32(2)(c), 32(3), 32(3)(f)

- The previous standard inspection reported that leaders were not meeting the requirements to provide parents with an annual report on their children's progress. Inspection evidence found that a detailed report is sent out to parents outlining the progress their child has made academically and socially. This annual report closely marries the findings against the child's education, health and care plan.
- In addition, the school did not make available to parents the name and address for correspondence of the chair of the governing body. Examination of the school's website shows the contact details of the chair of the governing body and other key members of the school leadership team are easily accessible for parents and carers.
- The standard in 32(1) is now met.

Part 7. Manner in which complaints are handled

Paragraph 33, 33(a), 33(b), 33(c), 33(d), 33(e), 33(f), 33(g), 33(h), 33(i), 33(i)(i), 33(j)(ii), 33(j), 33(j), 33(j), 33(j), 33(j),

- The previous standard inspection reported that leaders had not ensured that an effective procedure was in place to deal with the handling of complaints from parents and carers.
- The complaints policy on the website allows for an informal resolution of complaints at an early stage. It then clearly outlines the procedure for making a formal complaint in writing. If the complainant remains unhappy, the procedure sets out that a panel of three people, including one person who is independent of the Cambian Group, will be convened. The complainant may be accompanied to the panel. The policy includes a clear flow chart for complaints which contains timescales and other aspects of complaints management.
- Inspection evidence shows how leaders keep careful records of any complaints received to their resolution, including the actions the school has implemented to resolve parental concerns and complaints. In addition, leaders write to parents to indicate how many complaints have been made during the term and of actions taken.
- The standard in paragraph 33 is now met.

Part 8. Quality of leadership in and management of schools

Paragraph 34(1), 34(1)(a), 34(1)(b), 34(1)(c)

- The standard relating to the quality of leadership and management was unmet at the last standard inspection as the proprietor and school leaders had not ensured that all of the independent school standards were met consistently.
- The Department for Education (DfE) accepted the school's action plan with modifications. Leaders revised its action plan quickly to ensure that it incorporated all of the DfE's required modifications.
- The proprietor took rapid action following the standard inspection to recruit experienced leaders. The leadership structure has been strengthened to ensure that the actions

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taken to tackle the unmet standards are implemented quickly and effectively. Minutes of governors' meetings record increased rigour and challenge in holding leaders to account for the quality of education and care they provide for pupils.

- Current leaders are ambitious to drive forward improvements that ensure continual progress which enables pupils to receive a high quality standard of education. They have quickly gained the trust and support of staff, eloquently summed up with the comment, 'We are very lucky to have a wonderful new leadership team. They have taken a broken team and put us back together again.'
- Nonetheless, senior leaders confirm that there is further work to do to ensure that middle leaders rigorously monitor and develop the quality of teaching and learning so they know what does or does not work well and why. Leaders also recognise that systems they have implemented to improve the quality of education pupils receive have yet to be embedded.
- The standard in paragraph 34(1) is now met.



Compliance with regulatory requirements

This included the standards and requirements that the school was judged to not comply with at the previous inspection. Information about this school

■ Purbeck View School is registered as an independent special school and a children's home for boys and girls aged from seven to 19 who have complex needs, including autism, severe learning disabilities and severe emotional, social and mental health difficulties. The

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school is owned by the Cambian Group.

- The principal started in post in September 2017.
- All pupils have an education, health and care plan.
- A very small minority of pupils are eligible for the pupil premium funding. The school does not receive funding from the Year 7 catch-up fund or the sports premium.
- No pupils use alternative provision.
- The school's last standard inspection took place on 27–29 June 2017 when it was judged to be inadequate.



Information about this inspection

- This inspection was carried out at the request of the registration authority for independent schools. The purpose of the inspection was to monitor the progress the school has made in meeting the independent school standards and other requirements that it was judged to not comply with at its previous inspection.
- The inspection was the first progress monitoring inspection undertaken since the last standard inspection and was carried out with no notice.
- After the previous inspection, which found the school's overall effectiveness to be inadequate, the school was required to produce an action plan to explain how it would meet the independent school standards that were unmet at that time. This action plan was evaluated on 16 November 2017 and was approved with modifications by the DfE.
- Prior to the inspection, the lead inspector scrutinised a range of documentation, including that provided by the registration authority for independent schools. This included the previous inspection reports and the school's responses to the unmet standards set out in their action plan, relating to Parts 3, 6, 7 and 8. In addition, the lead inspector carefully checked the school's policies, and other information available to families on its website, to check compliance with the unmet standards identified at the previous standard inspection.
- Throughout the inspection, the inspector met with school leaders, held discussions with staff and spoke with pupils. The lead inspector also met with a director from the Cambian Group to discuss the effectiveness of actions taken since the previous standard inspection.
