Summary of key findings for parents

The provision is good

- The dedicated management team continually identifies and addresses areas for development and make ongoing improvements to enrich children's learning experiences. For example, they recently have been part of a pilot scheme which encourages children to live healthier lifestyles.
- The well-qualified and long-established staff team works effectively together in the excellently resourced nursery. They demonstrate strong teaching skills which promote children's learning well.
- Children behave well and they are friendly and chatty. The golden rules of the nursery are embedded in everyday activities and help children to develop an understanding of boundaries and behavioural expectations. Staff are positive role models who help children learn how to cooperate with each other, share and take turns.
- All children, including those receiving additional funding, make good and steady progress from their starting points. Staff quickly identifying any gaps in children's learning and put plans in place to support them.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- The manager tracks children's development well and identifies areas of need for specific groups. However, at times they are not highly effective at using this information to improve outcomes for all groups of children.
- Information gathered from parents does not consistently help staff with planning next steps in children's learning.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- strengthen how information from tracking is used to promote learning and development for children within specific groups in the nursery
- encourage parents to share meaningful information about children's learning and development at home.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities indoors and outdoors and assessed the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector spoke with staff and children during the inspection.
- The inspector completed a joint observation with the nursery management team.
- The inspector held a meeting with the nursery manager. She looked at relevant documentation and evidence of the suitability of staff working in the nursery.
- The inspector spoke to some parents during the inspection and took account of their views.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of leadership and management is good

Arrangements for safeguarding are effective. Management and staff are fully aware of their individual roles and responsibilities to protect children from harm and the procedures to follow if they are concerned about a child. The premises are safe and secure, and there are robust arrangements for the recruitment and selection of staff. All staff receive regular supervision and training to help them develop new skills and knowledge. This has had a positive impact on improving children's well-being and learning opportunities. The manager carries out regular checks on the progress that children make. This ensures children receive the support they need to make good progress. Managers gather the views of staff, parents and children to evaluate and continuously improve the nursery. For example, they have ambitious plans to develop the forest school area within the outdoor space.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Staff plan a broad range of stimulating activities indoors and outdoors that engages and sustains children's interest and motivation for learning. For example, babies explore their environment with great enthusiasm and confidence. They are keen to join in with activities, such as 'What's in the box?' and eagerly communicate with staff, who show a real interest in what they have to say. The outdoor area has been developed significantly and offers a range of learning experiences for children. For instance, children use a wide range of equipment that challenges their physical skills, such as tricycles and a climbing wall. Older children demonstrate a good knowledge of mathematical vocabulary, such as when they count out cutlery as they set the table and work out how many more forks they need.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

The diversity of the local community is reflected well within the nursery and there are plenty of opportunities for children to learn about cultures which are different to their own. For example, children learn about a wide range of festivals and enjoy visits from parents who share traditions from their culture. Staff are highly responsive to children's emotional needs. They are exceptionally caring and children develop very strong relationships with them. Effective arrangements help staff support children emotionally as they move to new groups in the nursery.

Outcomes for children are good

All children learn skills which will enable them to move on to the next stage of their learning. All children are encouraged to be independent. Older children help set the table for lunch and younger children help tidy away toys before heading out into the garden. Literacy skills are well supported. There is a lending library, where children can borrow a book to extend their learning at home.
