Summary of key findings for parents

The provision is good

- Staff create a welcoming, stimulating environment, where children learn through play.
- The dedicated manager leads the setting extremely well. She consistently evaluates the quality of her provision, setting challenging and realistic targets for improvement.
- Partnerships with parents are excellent and there is a regular two-way flow of information. Parents are kept up to date with the progress their child is making.
- Children make good progress in all areas of learning. They are well supported and prepared for the transition to school.
- Children are extremely happy and secure in the setting. Staff know the children well and have created strong attachments with them.

It is not yet outstanding because:

■ Although staff have had opportunities to broaden their professional development, these have not been utilised fully, to be able to enhance the quality of teaching.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

■ continue to explore opportunities to enhance the quality of teaching.

Inspection activities

- The inspector had a tour of the setting.
- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities indoors and outdoors, and assessed the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector conducted a joint observation with the manager.
- The inspector viewed documentation during the inspection, which included safeguarding policies, staff suitability checks, children's tracking documents and the setting's main policies and procedures.
- The inspector spoke with parents and took into account their views.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of leadership and management is good

Safeguarding is effective. The manager ensures that all staff are kept up to date with their knowledge and understanding in regards to keeping children safe. Staff are confident in their roles and responsibilities and know how to report any possible concerns about a child's welfare. The manager has created excellent partnerships with parents, giving them many opportunities to play an active role in their child's learning. Parents speak extremely highly of the staff and the setting, explaining that they feel very involved and that their opinions are taken on board at all times. The manager oversees the curriculum well and ensures that staff provide a range of exciting and stimulating experiences for the children. The manager continually reflects on the learning environment and works with staff to make changes that promote children's learning and incorporate their interests. She monitors each child's learning and development with great precision, enabling her to spot any gaps in their learning quickly. Staff spend a great deal of time preparing children for the transition to school, working closely with local schools and children's future teachers.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Qualified and enthusiastic staff teach children well. They support children of different abilities to develop their communication and language skills through a range of different activities. For example, staff use songs and puppets alongside story time to enable children who speak English as an additional language to be able to participate in the activity. Staff are able to adapt activities quickly to incorporate a child's particular interest. For example, a member of staff saw that a child had brought the dinosaurs over to the painting table and swiftly changed the activity so that the children could make dinosaur prints using the paint. Staff provide a wide range of opportunities for children to learn about people and communities that may be different from their own experience. They learn about a number of different festivals and cultures throughout the year.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Staff provide children with many opportunities to become independent learners. For example, children were encouraged to pour their own drinks during snack time. Staff provide the children with a stimulating, exciting and welcoming environment, indoors and outdoors. This keeps children motivated and interested in a broad range of activities. Staff are excellent role models for the children, demonstrating kind and respectful attitudes at all times. Children are well behaved and staff have clear strategies to support any children who may need support with their personal and social development.

Outcomes for children are good

Children are highly motivated and eager to join in with activities. They make good progress and are extremely well prepared for school. Children who speak English as an additional language make equally good progress because staff have high expectations for what all children can achieve.
