Summary of key findings for parents

The provision is good

- The effective key-person system fully supports children to swiftly settle in to this welcoming pre-school. Children build secure bonds with all staff and enjoy sharing photographs of their family with them.
- Children experience a wealth of interesting activities that ignite their curiosity and help them to make good progress. They learn about life cycles as they observe caterpillars creating their cocoon before transforming in to butterflies. Children also learn to care for and respect living things as they carefully handle giant African land snails.
- The well-qualified team of staff receive regular supervision meetings and have good training opportunities. For example, they regularly visit other pre-schools to discuss new ideas with other professionals. This helps children to positively benefit from new practices, such as introducing new methods to extend children's attention skills.
- The newly appointed enthusiastic manager and the staff team are reflective and regularly evaluate the provision they offer. Their commitment helps them to drive forward identified areas for improvement.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- Staff do not always encourage children to independently manage their own personal needs.
- Staff do not always gather detailed information from parents about their child's prior learning to enable them to sharply focus on children's precise learning needs from the outset.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- encourage children to independently manage their personal needs
- gain more detailed information from parents about what their child knows and can already do when they first start.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities indoors and outdoors and assessed the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector spoke with staff and children during the inspection.
- The inspector completed a joint observation with the manager.
- The inspector held a meeting with the manager. She looked at relevant documentation and evidence of the suitability of staff working in the pre-school and the administrator.
- The inspector spoke to parents during the inspection and took account of their views.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of leadership and management is good

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. The manager and staff are very aware of the procedures for identifying and responding to any concerns about a child's welfare. Children's safety is at the heart of every member of staff who consistently follow robust procedures. The manager monitors children's progress thoroughly and takes swift action to address any gaps in children's learning. Staff work closely with other professionals and implement the strategies they recommend to successfully support children who have special educational needs and/or disabilities. Secure working partnerships with staff at other settings that children attend support children's continuity in learning. Parents appreciate the ideas that staff provide to support their children's learning at home.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Staff provide children with the choice to play either indoors or outdoors. They ensure that both areas are well-resourced with a very good range of stimulating activities. Children confidently explore and investigate. They work out, through trial and error, that they need to pour large amounts of water through the funnel on the water foundation to make the wheel and cogs rotate. Staff provide children with many opportunities to develop the small muscles in their hands in preparation for writing. Children mould scented dough into different shapes and use small tools, cutters and rolling pins. Staff place a strong emphasis on promoting children's communication and language. They introduce them to new words and express a genuine interest in what they say. This motivates children to talk about the pets that they have at home. Staff effectively support children who speak English as an additional language to make good progress.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Staff are positive role models. Children behave well, use good manners and are beginning to build friendships with each other. They are proud of their achievements and are eager to share these with staff. Mealtimes are a social occasion. Staff use this opportunity to help children to understand the importance of a healthy diet and provide them with clear messages of the importance of a good hygiene routine. Children develop good physical skills. They persevere in pushing themselves along on the scuttle bicycles and thoroughly enjoy moving their bodies in rhythm to their favourite songs.

Outcomes for children are good

Children complete complex puzzles and count the number of chalks in a container. They use mathematical language, such as 'big' and 'small' to describe the marks they make with paint on the paper and their hands. Children express a keen interest in books. They use the props that staff provide to help them to make up their own stories. All children gain the skills needed to help prepare them for their next stage in learning.
