Summary of key findings for parents

The provision requires improvement. It is not yet good because:

- Staff do not ensure that the learning environment provides sufficiently challenging experiences that actively motivate and engage all children. In addition, children's focus sometimes diminishes during large-group activities.
- Staff do not gather precise information from parents about children's learning at home prior to starting.

It has the following strengths

- Staff keep children safe and protect them from harm. Management and staff monitor aspects of the provision. They complete risk assessments and check the environment daily, to ensure that all areas used by the children are safe and suitable.
- Many of the families using the nursery have had family connections with the setting for many years. Parents comment positively on the quality of care and learning their children receive. Those staff who work with children who have special educational needs and/or disabilities achieve particularly successful partnership working. They use consistent approaches to help support children's individual development.
- All children have daily opportunities for exercise and fresh air in the outdoor area. This helps to promote their physical development and supports their well-being. Children enjoy being outdoors, for example, they make marks with chalks and experiment with soil in the mud kitchen.
- At times, staff demonstrate effective teaching skills to support children's learning. For example, during small-group activities staff model some language and ask children questions to build on what they already know.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and Childcare Register the provider must:

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- enhance the provision for children's learning during routine group activities to keep them fully engaged and focused
- work more closely with parents to gather detailed information about what their children can already do so that their starting points in learning can be collaboratively identified on entry.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities indoors and outdoors and assessed the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector spoke with staff during the inspection.
- The inspector completed joint observations with the nursery manager.
- The inspector held a meeting with the provider and nursery manager. She looked at relevant documentation and evidence of the suitability of staff working in the nursery.
- The inspector spoke to parents during the inspection and took account of their views.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of leadership and management requires improvement

Staff do not gather precise information from parents about their children's capabilities when they first start at the nursery to establish their abilities accurately. However, once staff get to know children they use observation and assessment to identify what children need to learn next. The manager uses effective methods to monitor and evaluate the progress made by different groups of children to help improve their achievements. Procedures are in place, such as regular supervisory meetings, to support staff practice, although these are not effective to secure good-quality teaching consistently. Safeguarding is effective. Staff complete relevant training and have a sound knowledge of child protection procedures. They know the appropriate action to take should they have any concerns a child may be at risk of harm. The provider has appropriate recruitment and induction procedures in place to help to ensure that staff are suitable for their role. Staff are appropriately deployed and supervise children at all times. They do not leave children alone with new staff who have not yet been vetted.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment requires improvement

The quality of staff's teaching is variable. This means that children make steady rather than good progress in their development. Staff recognise that children learn through play and, generally, support them to engage in activities so that they make some progress in their learning. At times, staff's interaction with children is good. They get down to the children's level and talk to them as they play. Staff gently remind children about the need to take turns and share. They sing rhymes during whole-group activities and encourage children to join in with the familiar actions. However, for some children these group activities do not help them to maintain their engagement and involvement.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare require improvement

Staff organise the indoor and outdoor environments so that children have access to a suitable range of toys and resources. Children chose what they want to do. However, for some children, staff do not always provide a stimulating and challenging environment to help them make the best progress. On occasions, children initiate their own games and lapses in behaviour occur. Staff talk to children in a calm manner as they remind them of the nursery rules. They frequently praise children throughout the day. This helps to build children's confidence and sense of self-esteem. Staff are friendly and offer close attention and reassurance to help children to settle, promoting their emotional well-being. They communicate effectively with one another to meet children's individual care needs.

Outcomes for children require improvement

Children enjoy their time at the nursery. However, weaknesses in teaching mean that staff do not fully support children to make the best possible progress. Despite this, children do develop some key skills in readiness for their next stage of learning, including their move on to school. For example, they are becoming more independent as they select what they would like to eat for their snack. Children freely access books and enjoy sharing them with staff.

The Ark Centre registered in 2005. The nursery employs 15 members of childcare staff. Of these, 11 hold appropriate early years qualifications at level 3 or above. The nursery opens Monday to Friday during term time. Sessions are from 9.30am until 2.30pm. The nursery provides funded early education for three- and four-year-old children.
