Summary of key findings for parents

The provision is inadequate

- The childminder failed to report a significant event about her provision in a timely manner, which reflects on her suitability and knowledge of safeguarding children.
- The childminder does not have a secure knowledge and understanding of safeguarding, to enable her to identify and respond effectively to the signs of possible abuse and neglect.
- The childminder does not keep accurate records of the children in her care, including a daily register of the times children attend. This compromises children's safety.
- The childminder does not have a current paediatric first-aid qualification to ensure she is able to act appropriately in an emergency to support children's health.
- The childminder has not developed her teaching practice, which affects children's ability to learn well. As a result, they do not make adequate progress from their starting points.

It has the following strengths

■ The childminder is very welcoming and kind towards the children. Daily conversations with parents help to provide continuity of care.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

The provision is inadequate and Ofsted intends to take enforcement action:

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities and assessed how this affects children's learning.
- The inspector held a number of discussions with the childminder with regard to safeguarding. She looked at relevant documentation and evidence of suitability of persons living in the household.
- The inspector interacted with the children at appropriate times throughout the inspection.
- The inspector looked at records showing parents' written feedback.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of leadership and management is inadequate

Arrangements for safeguarding are ineffective. The childminder does not follow required procedures to notify other organisations, such as social services and Ofsted, where there are changes in her provision that may affect her ability to care for children. She has also not updated her safeguarding knowledge and does not have sufficient understanding of how she would protect a child in the event of a child protection concern. These weaknesses compromise children's safety and welfare. The childminder does not effectively review or evaluate her service, which results in breaches of the legal requirements. The childminder also does not make effective use of the available guidance to support her teaching practice to ensure children are fully supported to meet their learning goals for their ages and abilities.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is inadequate

Weaknesses in teaching and assessment mean children do not make the best progress in their learning and development. The childminder does not assess children's progress to identify their stage of development in line with their ages and abilities. Consequently, activities are not planned well to support children's next steps. The childminder is affectionate and speaks kindly to children. They enjoy exploring their toys, such as farm animals and blocks. However, the childminder does not use these resources well to further children's learning. For example, not enough emphasis is given to extending children's speech and communication before introducing more advanced areas, such as letters and counting. The childminder maintains communication with parents. She ensures that parents receive daily feedback about children's routines and experiences.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

Children's welfare is not adequately protected. The childminder does not keep accurate records of the children in her care. This includes details, such as times of attendance and personal details on every child. Furthermore, the childminder has failed to maintain a current paediatric first-aid qualification. The childminder has a range of resources suitable for the ages of children and she ensures children feel special, such as when she prepares tea parties for their birthdays. Children behave well. They also enjoy other events, such as Halloween celebrations and other cultural festivals. Children enjoy outdoor play, such as splashing in puddles after the rain. The childminder provides children with healthy snacks and offers drinks regularly, to support their physical health.

Outcomes for children are inadequate

Children do not make the progress they are capable of because teaching does not focus on their individual needs and next steps for learning. Although children are content, babies show little stimulation and older children are not fully meeting their learning goals, such as beginning to develop an awareness and independence towards managing their toileting needs. Children develop some physical skills, such as learning to connect blocks and build towers. They also learn to feed themselves. Children develop their social skills and learn to play with others. They have access to books and enjoy stories.
