Summary of key findings for parents

The provision is good

- The staff team actively promote British values and democracy. Children have opportunities to be part of the kid's club council and take part in discussions and votes to influence the development of the club.
- Relationships with parents are strong. Parents speak highly about the club.
- Children show high levels of well-being. New children settle into the club quickly as staff understand children's emotional needs.
- The needs of young children, including children who have special educational needs and/or disabilities are met well.
- Staff plan interesting activities that children are keen to take part in.
- The provider regularly exchanges information about children's development with the school children attend. They have developed a communication book to support daily conversations between parents and staff at the school children attend.
- Leaders and managers know children well and celebrate events that are important to them.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- Systems for self-evaluation do not yet take into account staff's monitoring records to raise the quality of practice even further and make meaningful improvements to the club.
- The time children spend engaged in meaningful play is sometimes affected by routine procedures led by adults.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- strengthen self-evaluation systems to clearly identify areas for development and raise the quality of practice even further
- maximise opportunities for children to engage in meaningful play.

Inspection activities

- The inspector met with several parents and also took note of the written comments of parents.
- The inspector observed children taking part in activities at the club.
- The inspector reviewed a range of documentation.
- The inspector held a meeting with the manager and spoke to staff.
- The inspector looked at the premises and the resources available to children.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of leadership and management is good

Safeguarding is effective. The premises are secure and leaders provide a stimulating environment for children. Staff demonstrate a comprehensive understanding of how to identify and respond to any concerns about children's welfare. They know the internal and the local authority referral procedures to follow. All staff working at the club have been checked for suitability through the Disclosure and Barring Service. Clear policies, procedures and risk assessments are in place. Children behave well and listen carefully to others. Staff act as role models as they engage with children during activities. Parents hold the provider in high regard. Leaders listen to the views of children and act on children's ideas.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

The environment is welcoming. Children of all ages enjoy their time in this friendly club. There is a good range of available resources and planned activities, enabling children to explore their own ideas. Children can make their own choices about what they would like to do and concentrate for long periods on activities they choose for themselves. They develop their physical dexterity as they decorate biscuits and use their imagination and express feelings as they play with small-world equipment. Children tell the inspector they like the club because they can take part in art, yoga, baking and junk modelling. Staff have a secure knowledge of children's development. They listen to children carefully and respond appropriately. Staff plan activities based on children's interests and requests they make during kid's club council meetings. Parents are well informed about the activities taking place.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Children have opportunities to take part in weekly yoga sessions that develop balance and coordination. They have regular access to the adjacent school field to develop their physical skills on a large scale. They learn about keeping healthy as they eat a range of fruit and vegetables at teatime. Children's emotional well-being is promoted effectively. They feel safe in the environment and confidently ask staff for help when required. Children are polite and can often be heard saying 'please' and 'thank you'. Children demonstrate their contentment as they sing songs to themselves during their play. They express pride in their achievements by proudly showing off their work and creations when their parents arrive to collect them. Staff work well with parents to find out about the children's individual needs before they come to the club. They support children to manage their own personal hygiene needs. Good behaviour is promoted through the kid's club council. Children devise their own rules, fostering a positive environment of mutual respect and tolerance for others.

Swanland Kids Club re-registered in 2016 due to a change in ownership, although it has been operating on the same site since 2006. The club is privately owned and currently employs five members of childcare staff. Two members of staff hold qualifications at level 3 and one member of staff holds a qualification at level 2. The club opens from Monday to Friday during term time. Sessions are from 7.30am until 9am and 3.30pm until 6pm.

This inspection was carried out by Ofsted under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.
