Summary of key findings for parents

This is a provision that requires improvement

- The childminder has failed to implement a programme of professional development, to improve knowledge and skills. She is unable to identify the gaps in her practice to enhance the quality of provision.
- The childminder does not effectively use observations and assessments to monitor children's progress. She does not plan challenging next steps to help children reach their full potential.

It has the following strengths

- The childminder has developed positive partnerships with parents. She keeps them informed about their child's daily routines. For example, the childminder works with parents to support children who are toilet training, to provide continuity of care between home and the provision.
- The childminder takes children on regular outings to the park and soft play centres, to access large climbing equipment, swings and slides. This helps children to develop their large-muscle skills.
- The childminder encourages children to put on their shoes and attempt to fasten the zips on coats. This helps children to develop their independence.
- Children have secure attachments with the childminder and are happy in her company. Children approach the childminder for cuddles and confidently ask her for toys and snacks.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and Childcare Register the provider must:

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of leadership and management requires improvement

Although the childminder evaluates her own practice and recognises some areas for improvement, she does not act on this. She has not implemented a professional development plan to ensure that she keeps up to date with current practice. This means that there are gaps in her skills and knowledge. The childminder is unaware of the latest guidance. For example, she does not actively promote and celebrate equality, diversity and culture, to extend children's understanding of others. The childminder misses opportunities to develop effective links with external agencies and early years advisers, to help her build on her knowledge and develop her own practice effectively. However, this does not have a significant impact on children's well-being or development. Safeguarding is effective. The childminder knows the signs and symptoms of possible abuse and knows how to escalate concerns about a child's welfare.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment requires improvement

The childminder does not regularly make clear observations and assessments to effectively monitor children's progress. She does not have a clear picture of children's starting points. The childminder does not consistently use early years foundation stage guidance to help her correctly identify children's levels of development and plan challenging next steps. This means that the childminders expectations of what children can achieve are not always high enough. The childminder sometimes misses opportunities to extend activities to motivate children to learn further. However, she does follow children's interests and encourages them to make choices about their own play. Children enjoy activities, such as playing with cars and trains on a road mat to help develop their imaginative skills.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare require improvement

The childminder does not consistently provide an engaging or stimulating environment to inspire children to explore. She does not sufficiently spark children's curiosity for learning because she does not always challenge children effectively. The childminder supports children to develop positive hygiene routines. For example, children learn to wash their hands before lunch. The childminder is warm and caring. The childminder acts as a positive role model and demonstrates the behaviour she expects. Children are polite and behave well. Children learn to wait, as they take turns pushing cars between themselves and the childminder.

Outcomes for children require improvement

A weak monitoring system, means that gaps in children's learning are not quickly identified. Children are not sufficiently challenged to help them make the best progress possible. Children develop some key skills for their next stage of learning, including school. For example, children use pencils and paper to practise their early writing skills.
