This provision meets requirements

- The childminder fully understands how to help to protect children's safety and welfare, and prevent them from harm. She has a good knowledge of the safeguarding and child protection procedures to follow, including whom to contact to seek additional advice.
- The childminder understands the benefits of establishing positive partnerships and communicating effectively with parents and other early years professionals.
- The childminder understands the importance of evaluating her practice. She keeps up to date with new and current early years updates. For example, she carries out regular and beneficial training to develop her skills and knowledge even further.
- The childminder understands the benefits of closely monitoring and tracking children's progress. She knows about the different ways that children learn and how to help them to gain skills to support their future learning and make progress.
- The childminder understands the importance of teaching children positive values. For instance, she intends to encourage them to be kind, polite and behave well.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

- The inspector looked at documents and policies that the childminder intends to use in practice.
