Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- The childminder does not meet the requirements for the early years foundation stage and Childcare Register. Children's safety and welfare are compromised. The childminder is not able to recognise when an allegation is made against people working or living on the premises to ensure she can follow the correct procedure.
- The childminder does not understand the role of other agencies also involved in safeguarding children. This means she is not able to meet her duty to refer to other agencies should the need arise.
- The childminder does not always follow appropriate hygiene procedures to eliminate any possibilities of cross-contamination and infection.

It has the following strengths

- The childminder has developed good partnerships with other providers that children also attend. They work together to help children progress and develop further.
- Children make good progress from their starting points. They develop good social and communication skills.
- Parents regularly receive detailed information about their children's learning and development.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and Childcare Register the provider must:

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of leadership and management is inadequate

Safeguarding is ineffective. Although the childminder knows the correct procedure to follow when an allegation is made, she does not always recognise such allegations. This puts children's safety and welfare at risk. In addition, the childminder is not clear of the roles of agencies with statutory responsibilities in protecting children from harm. This means that she is not able to refer to the correct agency to protect children when the need arises. The childminder maintains the required records, such as children's attendance. The childminder makes the most of training opportunities available. Although this helps her to ensure children's good progress, her knowledge of safeguarding has not improved. Parents report they are pleased with the care their children receive.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

The childminder regularly observes children and has a good overview of their abilities and interests. She uses this knowledge to plan a variety of activities that children enjoy and which promotes their learning. For example, older children enjoy the imaginary play area with various household items. Babies thoroughly enjoy exploring musical toys with buttons and movable parts. The childminder is skilful in balancing interaction between children of different ages. For example, when she has older children and babies in her care, they all play together with age-appropriate activities. The childminder has meaningful discussions with older children using questions, while introducing simple language to the babies to help extend their vocabulary.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

Due to the weaknesses in safeguarding, children's safety and welfare are not assured. In addition, the childminder does not always follow good hygiene routines. For example, when feeding babies she does not consider the risk of cross-contamination. This does not support good health. However, children are supervised effectively and ratio requirements are maintained to meet children's individual needs. The childminder knows all of the children very well. Children settle quickly and build secure bonds with the childminder. They behave well, cooperate, and learn to respect each other.

Outcomes for children are good

All children, including those with special educational needs and/or disabilities, make good progress. They gain the skills they need for the next stages in their learning, including for school. For example, older children learn how to recognise letters. All children develop good independence skills. For example, they make choices in their play and learn how to take care of their own needs.
