Summary of key findings for parents

This is a provision that requires improvement

- The procedures for risk assessment are not consistently robust. Potential hazards, specifically in the outdoor play areas, are overlooked and not removed quickly enough to minimise any risk of harm to children.
- The supervision and coaching of staff are not effective enough to ensure all aspects of staff's practice are robust. Consequently, the quality of children's care and learning is not consistently good.
- Staff do not consistently plan and provide outdoors activities for the youngest children on a daily basis, to fully promote their health and well-being.
- At times, staff do not effectively engage younger children in learning. Some group activities do not support younger children's engagement and involvement as well as they do for older children.

It has the following strengths

- Staff focus well on providing opportunities for children to develop their early literacy skills. They encourage children to take part in singing rhymes and songs. Staff support children to develop an interest and enjoyment of books. They provide activities to help children develop their physical skills to handle tools, such as pencils.
- Relationships between staff, children and parents are positive. Staff work effectively with parents and keep them well informed, therefore, helping to ensure children's care and learning needs are suitably addressed.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and Childcare Register the provider must:

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- improve the self-evaluation processes to help identify weaknesses in the provision and to address these quickly
- build further on staff knowledge and skills to help support younger children's engagement and involvement consistently.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities indoors and outdoors, and assessed the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector spoke with staff and children during the inspection.
- The inspector completed a joint observation with the nursery manager.
- The inspector held a meeting with the nursery manager. She looked at relevant documentation and evidence of the suitability of staff working in the nursery.
- The inspector spoke to a number of parents during the inspection and took account of their views.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of leadership and management requires improvement

Staff complete risk assessments for all indoor areas well. They do not, however, recognise the potential risk to older children with regard to the wet leaves and water on equipment in the outdoor play area. However, older children are well supervised during these times. The self-evaluation procedures include the views of all staff, parents and children. However, these procedures do not focus closely enough on identifying all possible weaknesses in the nursery. Safeguarding is effective. Managers and staff have a sound knowledge and understanding of child protection issues and the action they must take to protect children. The manager undertakes recruitment and ongoing checks to ensure that staff are suitable to work with children.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment requires improvement

The quality of teaching varies and requires improvement. Staff do not always receive consistently effective coaching to help them improve their practice. For example, during group time for the youngest children, staff did not engage these children successfully. As a result, activities are not well planned to fully support the progress of this group of children. Overall, staff make regular observations of children's play and identify the next steps in learning. Children in the pre-school room use the exciting resources set up by staff to learn and explore. For example, older children use scissors, pens and glue to create their own story board. Staff use a range of questioning techniques to encourage older children to talk about their findings and to solve problems.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare require improvement

Due to weaknesses in the nursery's risk assessment procedures, older children's welfare is not fully protected. Staff support toddlers' indoor explorations well. They do not, however, make sure that all toddlers are taken out in the fresh air every day. Children develop good independence skills. For example, younger children learn to feed themselves from an early age. Staff work well in partnership with parents to identify and meet children's individual dietary requirements. Staff are warm towards the children in their care. They praise children meaningfully throughout the day for all their achievements. Staff help children to learn about rules and how to behave well. This helps children to develop strong emotional attachments and to build new friendships over time.

Outcomes for children require improvement

Not all children make the progress they are capable of. For example, group activities are not well planned to fully support the engagement of the youngest children. Throughout the nursery children learn to initiate their own play. Pre-school children develop an interest and understanding of number, shape and size in readiness for school. They learn to recognise the sounds letters make, and identify and write letters and numbers.

Little Lambs Childcare registered in 2006. The nursery employs nine members of childcare staff. Of these, two hold appropriate early years qualifications at level 6, six at level 3 and one holds level 2. The nursery opens from Monday to Friday all year round. Sessions are from 7.30am until 6pm. The nursery provides funded early education for two-, three- and four-year-old children.
