# Summary of key findings for parents

## This provision is good

- This small and welcoming nursery is led and managed effectively. Managers and staff work very well together. They set high standards and show a strong desire to continually improve.
- Staff support parents and work with other professionals exceptionally well to meet the needs of children who have special educational needs and/or disabilities. This makes a significant difference in helping children to develop and achieve to their best potential.
- Teaching is good. Staff have fun with the children and offer a range of challenging activities that help them to make good progress from their individual starting points.
- Staff are warm, caring and affectionate towards children. This helps children to form strong bonds and to feel very comfortable and emotionally secure in their care.
- Staff build trusting relationships with parents and carers. They keep them well informed of children's progress and share ideas and activities that help them to continue children's learning at home.
- Staff have made vast improvements to the outdoor play areas. In particular, the rear garden offers exciting experiences that help to support children's developing imaginations.
- Although partnerships with parents are good, staff do not maximise opportunities to fully involve parents in discussions about the use and benefits of additional funding, such as early years pupil premium funding, on children's outcomes.

# What the setting needs to do to improve further

#### To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

strengthen procedures to promote greater parental involvement in discussions about the use and benefits of additional funding on children's learning.

#### **Inspection activities**

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities and assessed the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector spoke to staff and children and completed a joint observation with the manager.
- The inspector held discussions with the provider and the manager. She looked at relevant documentation and evidence of the suitability of staff working in the nursery.
- The inspector spoke to some parents during the inspection and took account of written feedback from parent questionnaires.

# **Inspection findings**

#### Effectiveness of leadership and management is good

Safeguarding is effective. Managers maintain high adult-to-child ratios and make sure that staff are well deployed to supervise children and keep them safe. Staff have a robust understanding of their responsibilities to protect children. They know how to respond swiftly and effectively should any concerns about children or adults be identified. Managers analyse the progress made by individual and groups of children to help to identify and close any emerging gaps. They use feedback from staff, parents and other professionals to help them evaluate and improve the quality of practice. Managers help staff to enhance their skills by providing supervision and ongoing development opportunities. For example, recent training relating to the formation of attachments between staff and children has helped staff to deepen their understanding and has had a positive effect on children's behaviour.

### Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Staff know children very well and talk confidently about their individual abilities and interests. They accurately assess children's skills and closely monitor their progress. This means they can quickly identify any delays in children's learning and plan any necessary interventions. Staff focus strongly on developing children's communication and language skills. They organise small-group activities based on children's abilities in this area of learning which helps them to tailor their teaching according to children's needs. A range of visual prompts is routinely used to enhance children's understanding. Staff enthusiastically join in with children's imaginative play, for instance, when they pretend to be pirates. They ask meaningful questions that encourage children to share their thoughts and ideas. Children make choices and engage well in the good range of activities on offer.

#### Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Children are excited to see staff and their friends following the Christmas break. Parents report that they are very impressed with the activities provided and the enthusiastic atmosphere in the nursery. They say, 'Staff go the extra mile to make sure parents and children are happy'. Children's behaviour is good and any minor incidents are managed skilfully and with sensitivity. Staff use every opportunity to promote children's independence. They are very good role models and their positive and consistent messages help children to learn to be kind and considerate to others. Children learn the importance of developing a healthy and active lifestyle. They enjoy outdoor play and they have free access to fresh fruit and water at any time. Staff and children enjoy eating healthy food together and staff help children to develop good social skills.

#### Outcomes for children are good

Children are very well supported to develop the skills and attitudes to support their future learning. They enthusiastically join in with musical activities that help them to understand different letter sounds and to practise early writing. Children follow routines well and develop good mathematical skills as they play. They learn how to recycle items which helps them to contribute to taking care of the environment.

First Steps Nursery registered in 2016. The nursery employs five members of childcare staff. Of these, four hold appropriate early years qualifications at level 3 or above. The nursery opens from Monday to Friday, term time only. Sessions are from 8am until 3.30pm. The nursery provides funded early education for two-, three- and four-year-old children.
