Monitoring visit Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

## Information about this children's home

This home provides care for up to five children who have a learning disability. The home is operated by a national, private organisation.

The registered manager has recently resigned from this service, as has the interim manager who was covering this post. At present, a further interim manager is in day-to-day charge of the home. They are supported by the responsible individual and staff from the organisation's quality team.

# This monitoring visit

This children's home was judged to have declined in effectiveness at the interim inspection on 5 November 2018. At that inspection, inspectors identified serious weaknesses in how well children were helped and protected. These concerns related to poor leadership and management oversight.

Due to the severity of the concerns, a restriction of accommodation was issued after the interim inspection. Following this monitoring visit, Ofsted concludes that insufficient action has been taken to manage the home effectively and to fully safeguard the one child who lives here. As a result, the restriction will remain in place.

The inspector did not access the home or spend time with the child during this visit. The manager advised the inspector that visitors to the home can act as a trigger for the child to become unsettled, and described the current situation as volatile. A recent increase in the frequency and severity of behavioural incidents has resulted in the safety of the child and staff being seriously compromised. Staff have been injured and the home damaged.



Although the manager was concerned that unfamiliar people can be a trigger for incidents, a member of staff who had not worked at this home before had been asked to do so earlier on the same day. This staff member was not well prepared and was not clear about risks and expectations to care for this child safely.

The interim manager reported that she had made the decision to give notice to the placing authority to end the child's placement at the home. This followed an incident when she concluded that there was a 'possible risk to life'. At the time of this visit, an alternative and more appropriate home is being identified.

<ul> <li>lead and manage the home in a way that is consistent with the approach and ethos, and deliver the outcomes, set out in the home's statement of purpose; ensure that staff have the experience, qualifications and skills to meet the needs of each child; ensure that the home has sufficient staff to provide care to each child; ensure that the home's workforce provides continuity of care to each child; understand the impact that the quality of care provided in the home is having on the progress and experiences of each child and use this understanding to inform the development of the quality of care provided in the home; and use monitoring and review systems to make continuous improvements in the quality of care provided in the home.</li> <li>(Regulation 13 (1)(a)(b)(2)(a)(c)(d)(e)(f)(h))</li> <li>In particular:</li> <li>Continue to prioritise the review and assessment of the child's needs.</li> <li>In response to this review and assessment, continue to ensure that staff have the training, skills and experience required to meet his needs.</li> <li>Take urgent action to ensure that staff who are administering medication have been assessed as competent by a suitable person.</li> <li>Continue to ensure that staff have specialist training in meeting the needs of children with autism spectrum disorders, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder and obsessive-compulsive disorder. Take urgent action to ensure that where staff have not received up-to-date training in physical restraint that this training is provided without delay.

The registered person must make arrangements for the handling, recording, safekeeping, safe administration and disposal of medicines received into the children's home.	
In particular the registered person must ensure that—	



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medicines kept in the home are stored in a secure place so as to prevent any child from having unsupervised access to them; medicine which is prescribed for a child is administered as prescribed to the child for whom it is prescribed and to no other child; and a record is kept of the administration of medicine to each child.	
Paragraph (2) does not apply to medicine which—	
is stored by the child for whom it is provided in such a way that other persons are prevented from using it; and may be safely self-administered by that child.	
In this regulation, "prescribed" means—

within 24 hours of the use of a measure of control, discipline or restraint in relation to a child in the home, a record is made which includes—

Ensure that staff respond effectively when children are injured during incidents when restraint is used.
