Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

Information about this children's home

This privately owned children's home is operated by a large national provider. It is registered to care for up to five children and young people, aged between 10 and 17, who have complex needs and have experienced trauma and/or loss.

The manager has been registered since July 2018 and is in the process of completing the required qualification.

This monitoring visit

This monitoring visit took place to monitor a restriction notice and the requirements made following an interim inspection on 7 December 2018. During the interim inspection, the home was judged to have declined in effectiveness.

This monitoring visit found that some progress has been made since the interim inspection. For example, care planning, joint working with other professionals, and work to support young people to understand positive relationships have all improved. In addition, staff now have a greater understanding of the home's statement of purpose. No children have moved into the home since the restriction notice was served.

Despite positive progress in some areas, this inspection identified continued breaches of regulations. Specifically, previously identified shortfalls in relation to education, leadership and management and the protection of children have not been sufficiently addressed. Although the manager has been supported by senior managers to implement various strategies, these are yet to be effective and are not always consistently followed.

Staff do not engage all young people effectively. Not all young people attend education or are supported adequately to learn. For example, one young person requires the use of a computer but only has limited access to one. Staff do not always follow the young person's education timetable or use his incentive reward chart to encourage him to attend. As such, staff are failing to consistently support all

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young people to access education and achieve the best possible outcomes.

Young people continue to smoke cigarettes and cannabis in their bedrooms. The inspector found cigarette filters in one young person's bedroom despite staff reporting that they had completed a room check earlier that day. This demonstrates that room checks are not effective in identifying risks.

The fire risk assessment for the home does not detail that young people are known to smoke in their rooms. Nor does it identify measures to reduce these risks. There is no clear guidance for staff detailing what action they need to take. As a result, young people and others in the home are at significant risk of harm due to the ineffective strategies implemented around fire safety.

Maintenance to the home is ongoing. Previous damage to the front door needs addressing, with cigarette burn marks evident on entering the property. The carpet in some areas of the property needs cleaning/replacing.

The registered manager has started to implement training for the staff team relating to safeguarding, managing disclosures, and the home's statement of purpose, with further training planned. The knowledge gained from training is yet to be embedded in practice, with some incidents not being managed as well as they should have been. The registered manager's review of incidents lack scrutiny and reflection. This is a missed opportunity to learn from practice and drive improvement to ensure that young people receive the post possible care.
