## Summary of key findings for parents

### This provision is outstanding

- Children who have special educational needs and/or disabilities thrive in this fully inclusive environment. Staff use their exceptional knowledge of individual children and work resolutely to implement tailor made strategies for each child and their family. They use innovative methods, such as sign language, pictures and real objects, to help children to understand what is happening now and what will happen next.
- Staff establish exceptionally positive partnerships with parents, keep them extremely well informed about their children's progress and routinely share children's learning and achievements. They plan regular open day sessions where parents can spend time in the nursery and join in with activities that their children are involved in.
- Managers have established a strong vision for the nursery and include all staff in their continual drive for excellence. High-quality training opportunities, including focused supervision meetings, are highly effective in supporting the ongoing professional development needs of all staff. They support staff extremely well to take responsibility for leading aspects of practice and develop expertise within the team.
- Staff collect thorough information about care, learning and routines from parents before children start. They use this remarkably well to support each child's individual needs. Babies who have recently started at the nursery form exceptionally strong attachments with their key person. They receive high levels of attention and care as they gain confidence to explore the learning environment.

## What the setting needs to do to improve further

### To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- continue to strengthen the excellent range of opportunities older children have to further develop their independence when using a wide range of tools and equipment in their self-chosen activities.

### Inspection activities

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities indoors and outdoors and assessed the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector spoke with staff and children during the inspection.
- The inspector completed a joint observation with the nursery deputy manager.
- The inspector held a meeting with the nursery management team. She looked at relevant documentation and evidence of the suitability of staff working in the nursery.
- The inspector spoke to a number of parents during the inspection and took account of their views.

## Inspection findings

### Effectiveness of leadership and management is outstanding

Safeguarding is effective. Children's welfare is central to the work of all staff. Managers have created a culture of vigilance throughout the setting and ensure that all staff understand their role in safeguarding children. All staff have a robust understanding of the procedures to follow to ensure children are kept safe at all times. Managers and staff monitor and track the progress of individual children and different groups extremely well. This enables them to identify any gaps in learning rapidly. They provide exceptional support for children to catch up quickly and make rapid progress in their learning and development. All staff are fully committed to working in partnership with a wide range of external specialists, parents and other settings to support excellent outcomes for all children. They actively seek feedback from all agencies and use this to improve their excellent practice even further.

### Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is outstanding

Qualified staff skilfully play alongside children within the learning environment. They plan a wide range of challenging and stimulating activities and use every opportunity to extend children's learning. For instance, two-year-olds demonstrate extremely high levels of involvement when they pretend to make cakes and cups of tea to take to a birthday party for characters from a book they have previously read. Staff are exceptionally skilled at supporting children's early literacy skills and promoting a strong interest in books from a young age. Pre-school children enthusiastically retell a story when they pretend to go on a bear hunt in the outdoor area. They are highly engaged throughout and ask staff to repeat the activity so they can act out different roles, which helps to consolidate their learning even further.

### Personal development, behaviour and welfare are outstanding

Children benefit from many opportunities to explore the superb outdoor learning environment. Pre-school children learn to challenge their physical skills as they climb and move around the woodland area. They demonstrate remarkably high levels of perseverance as they climb a steep hill and excitedly shout 'I did it' when they reach the top. They respond extremely positively to praise from staff and take great pride in their achievements. Children demonstrate exceptionally high levels of emotional well-being. Staff have plans to strengthen the already excellent opportunities that older children have to further develop their independence skills when using a range of tools and equipment in their self-chosen activities. Children demonstrate extremely high levels of positive behaviour. They learn to consider the feelings of others and understand that they can help one another as they play together.

### Outcomes for children are outstanding

Children make excellent progress from their starting points. They are highly inquisitive and demonstrate a very positive attitude towards learning. Babies explore their play area confidently and develop strong early communication skills. Two-year-olds develop superb self-care skills, learning to dress themselves to go outside and using cutlery to explore real fruits and vegetables in the role-play area. Pre-school children are highly motivated learners and are extremely well prepared for their move to school.
