This is a privately owned home for three children who have emotional and/or behavioural needs, and/or a mental disorder, and/or a learning disability. The provider has four children's homes registered with Ofsted.

The registered manager was registered by Ofsted in 2016.

This inspection

The effectiveness of the home and the progress and experiences of children and young people since the most recent full inspection

This home was judged requires improvement to be good at the last full inspection. At the interim inspection, Ofsted judges that it has sustained effectiveness.

Since the last inspection, a new manager, who was intending to take over the role of registered manager, has left the service and a new deputy manager has been appointed. The registered manager remains in post. Two children are currently in placement. The previous inspection highlighted a number of shortfalls, most of which have been resolved successfully. Some shortfalls remain unresolved.

The previous inspection found that the home's staffing rota did not accurately convey the hours and shifts worked by individual staff members; this remains the case. The home's rota does not accurately correspond to information in the staff sign-in book. The sign-in book confirms shifts worked by staff. Managers acknowledge this discrepancy and acknowledge that this remains a breach of the regulations.

Managers' vetting practice of new staff is not sufficiently thorough. This was highlighted as a weakness at the last inspection and remains unresolved at this inspection. Managers are unable to produce confirmation of staff's formal qualifications. Since the last inspection, team members have enrolled on appropriate training courses.

Managers continue to fail to provide all staff with consistent formal and individual supervision. In some cases, staff personnel files identify significant gaps in the frequency of staff supervision. This does not confirm that managers are providing adequate support to staff. Similarly, managers do not consistently carry out staff annual appraisals. Training opportunities for the staff team show some improvement since the last inspection.

The quality of staff's recording has improved. This includes records of the home's admissions and discharges, and positive handling guidelines. However, further improvements are needed in staff's recording of when children go missing and when staff restrain children.

There have been a number of safeguarding notifications forwarded to Ofsted. Some of these have not been promptly forwarded as required.

The home's statement of purpose has been revised. The home has undergone a programme of repair and redecoration. The reception area and children's bedrooms are now well presented, well decorated, and equipped with appropriate furniture. Children say that they are happy with their surroundings.

The home's two front doors have now been covered appropriately to ensure the privacy



of children and others.

The home has received a number of complaints since the last inspection. Some of these have been made by children. Records of complaints demonstrate that issues are thoroughly and sensitively managed. The outcomes following complaints are now well documented. The management of allegations against staff is also thorough, and records are clear and detailed.

Children make steady progress and are happy living in the home. A child told the inspector, 'The staff here are alright, my room is OK, the food is fine. Everything is fine.' These sentiments were echoed by a parent and a local authority social worker during the inspection. The social worker commented, 'There is good communication with the staff team, and they get back to me promptly. I have no concerns.' A child's parent said, 'I'm happy for him to be here. He's in safe hands. Staff care for him; they are polite and nice. They treat him as family.'

There are significant shortfalls in the leadership and management of the home. This requires prompt resolution if the home is to be considered a good service.
