Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- The childminder continues to lack awareness of her responsibility to meet the early years requirements and further weaknesses have been identified.
- The childminder does not have a good enough understanding of all child protection procedures. She lacks understanding of the reporting procedures to follow if she was concerned about a child and this puts children's welfare at risk.
- The childminder does not risk assess her home well enough to ensure all hazards are removed to protect children's safety. She does not make best use of her available space for children to play comfortably in.
- The childminder does not keep an accurate record of the hours of attendance for children who attend.
- The childminder fails to assess children's progress effectively and plan activities that meet children's individual learning needs. Children do not make adequate progress from their starting points.
- The childminder has a weak understanding of how to support young children to become independent with some self-care routines. For example, helping children with toilet training skills.

It has the following strengths

■ Children behave well. They learn to share and take turns with the activities available.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of leadership and management is inadequate

Safeguarding is ineffective. The childminder has failed to address weaknesses raised at previous inspections and this is having a negative impact on the care and learning experiences for the children. The childminder lacks a clear awareness of safeguarding procedures. She is unable to find her safeguarding information and is unaware of who to contact about a child's welfare. The childminder does not maintain an accurate daily record of the names of the children looked after and their hours of attendance. These breaches of requirements put children's welfare and safety at risk.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is inadequate

The quality of teaching continues to be weak. Despite the childminder attending some training her knowledge of how to help children make the progress they should remains poor. She has not used the training to develop the skills she needs to make necessary improvements. The childminder does not assess children's progress regularly or accurately enough to identify their stages of development and to see where there are gaps in learning. She does not plan activities to help individual children's developmental needs and relies too much on children having free play with the toys available. As a result, children become bored, wander around and are not engaged in purposeful learning experiences. Although the childminder talks with children as they play, she does not interact enough to guide their learning and extend their language further. The childminder has completed the required progress check on children when they are between two and three years and has shared this with parents. However, she does not use this information effectively to make a difference to children's learning.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

Due to the weaknesses in safeguarding, children's safety and welfare are not assured. The childminder does not risk assess her home adequately and remove hazards from children's reach. For example, children are at risk of injury from heavy glass ornaments falling from shelves in the hallway. The childminder has not considered the risk of choking to young babies who play with toys with small pieces. In addition, the childminder had left medicines in a bag which were in reach for children. The childminder does not make good use of the available space in her home. Children spend long periods of time in the kitchen playing on the cold floor, despite having a playroom. On the day of the inspection the childminder was using the playroom for storage and children had limited access to it. This hinders children being able to make choices and be motivated in their play. The childminder lacks an awareness of how to introduce toilet training routines to children. As a result, children are not supported to develop these necessary personal care skills promptly.

Outcomes for children are inadequate

Children do not make the progress they are capable of due to weaknesses in teaching. They are not supported effectively to make the best possible progress, particularly in their communication and language and in developing their independence. This does not help them develop the skills they need for starting school. Children enjoy singing some rhymes and begin to recognise numbers and letters on bricks as they build.
