Information about this children's home

This home is owned by a private company. It is one of four operated under a contract with a large local authority. It is registered to provide care and accommodation for up to four children who may have experienced trauma, placement and family breakdown.

The organisation's clinical psychologist provides a service to staff and children.

The manager is in the process of registering with Ofsted.

This inspection

The effectiveness of the home and the progress and experiences of children and young people since the most recent full inspection

This home was judged good at the last full inspection. At the interim inspection, Ofsted judges that it has declined in effectiveness.

Since the last inspection, there has been a change to management arrangements in the home. The previous registered manager resigned her post in December 2018. The current manager took over the day-to-day running of the home at that time. Ofsted is currently considering his application for registration.

Managers have failed to take sufficient action to address the one requirement raised at the last inspection. As a result, children do not receive consistently good quality care and support. Ofsted has raised a further three requirements at this inspection.

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Managers and staff do not ensure that they arrange necessary health and safety repairs within an acceptable timescale. For example, there was an eight-week gap between staff reporting exposed wires to the maintenance team and the completion of this repair. This potentially places children at risk of harm.

The home is not a comfortable environment. This is because damaged and broken furniture has not been replaced. Also, a lack of dining room furniture means that children cannot enjoy communal meals with each other and staff. Consequently, children do not live in a welcoming, well-furnished or well-maintained home.

Children do not receive well-planned or integrated care. This is because managers do not make sure that staff are aware of the decisions made during children's statutory reviews. The aims and objectives of the placing authorities are not consistently included in internal care and support plans. This has the potential to limit children's progress and development.

Staff are competent in identifying risks that pose a threat to children's safety. However, risk assessments and risk management plans are generic and do not identify suitable or effective strategies to manage and reduce known risks to children's safety. This means that children remain at potential risk of harm.

There are occasions when managers address children's concerns appropriately. However, this is not consistent. The managers' investigation into a recent allegation did not follow internal or statutory safeguarding procedures. The scope of this investigation was insufficient to conclude whether the allegation was upheld or if children were, or are, at risk. This is detrimental to children's safety and welfare.

The current manager has taken steps to improve routine monitoring in the home to identify practice shortfalls. However, these monitoring systems remain in their infancy. This means that managers have yet to address deficits in some documents, such as how staff complete admission and discharge records. Consequently, information retained in the home is not up to date.

Staff now receive regular practice-related supervision. Managers also ensure that minutes of these meetings are available for staff to review and comment on. Consequently, staff are now able to reflect on their practice.

Children enjoy generally positive relationships with staff. They say that they are happy in the home and feel supported by staff.
