Information about this children's home

A local authority runs this home, which is registered to provide care and accommodation for up to six children. The statement of purpose says that it provides a residential experience for children needing accommodation for a period of assessment. It also provides a service to children who need emergency, respite or short-term placements.

The manager has been registered with Ofsted since October 2018.

This inspection

The effectiveness of the home and the progress and experiences of children and young people since the most recent full inspection

This home was judged requires improvement to be good at the last full inspection. At the interim inspection, Ofsted judges that it has improved effectiveness.

The registered manager now has more involvement in the decision-making about which children are offered a service. This has prevented children who have been assessed as not likely to benefit from staying in the home being placed.

A requirement was made at the last inspection about the quality of the assessments that are carried out before a child moves into the home. While some improvements have been made, the quality of these assessments remains variable. For example, not all show that full consideration has been given to the compatibility of the children or the ability of the staff team to care for the children's individual and collective needs. Two other requirements made at the last inspection about record-keeping and management

monitoring have been addressed.

Staff develop a good understanding and knowledge of the children they care for. Staff take the time to find out about children's needs and preferences and use this information to make sure that children have opportunities to achieve goals and make progress. It was positive to see that staff, when appropriate, took part in fun and educational activities with the children. This has helped children to forge strong and trusting relationships with staff and to learn that they can enjoy the company of an adult.

The risk management arrangements are effective in supporting staff in their roles. Staff provide children with firm and consistent boundaries. Direct work with children supports them to begin to understand how their behaviour impacts on them and their life chances. Some children have, as a result, stopped the behaviours that put them in danger. For example, one child staying in the home ceased taking risks altogether. This child had a very successful move back home. The child's mother said that the shared care arrangement 'helped him turn his life around.'

Staff work well with other agencies and professionals to support children to keep safe and make progress in their lives. When other professionals or agencies do not provide the input or services the child needs, the staff provide strong and successful challenge. Since the last inspection, a new deputy has joined the home and the manager has been registered with Ofsted. The management monitoring arrangements are effective in making sure that the management team has a good sense of where developments are required. Managers have begun to progress the plans to make improvements in the home. However, the arrangements for monitoring by an independent person are weak. This shortfall has been recognised and alternative arrangements are being considered.

assess whether each child is at risk of harm, taking into account information in the child's relevant plans and if necessary make arrangements to reduce any risk of harm to the child. (Regulation 12 (2)(a)(i))	
The registered person should ensure that all admission risk assessments are of an acceptable quality. In particular, the assessments must show that detailed assessments have been carried out about the impact that the placement will have on the child and the existing group of children considered. There should also be consideration of the staff's ability to meet children's individual and collective needs. If staff require any training to enable them to meet the child's identified needs, this must be provided.

Inspectors have looked closely at the experiences and progress of children and young people. Inspectors considered the quality of work and the differences made to the lives of children and young people. They watched how professional staff work with children and young people and each other and discussed the effectiveness of help and care provided. Wherever possible, they talked to children and young people and their families. In addition, the inspectors have tried to understand what the children's home knows about how well it is performing, how well it is doing and what difference it is making for the children and young people whom it is trying to help, protect and look after.

This inspection focused on the effectiveness of the home and the progress and experiences of children and young people since the most recent full inspection.

Using the 'Social care common inspection framework', this inspection was carried out under the Care Standards Act 2000 to assess the effectiveness of the service, how it meets the core functions of the service as set out in legislation, and to consider how well it complies with the Children's Homes (England) Regulations 2015 and the 'Guide to the children's homes regulations including the quality standards'.
