# Summary of key findings for parents

## This provision is outstanding

- The dedicated management team has an exceptional approach to leading its staff.

  Managers are passionate about creating an environment where children have the
  freedom to learn and develop in their own unique ways. They constantly reflect on and
  evaluate the provision and act on feedback from the parents, children and staff.
- Children make excellent progress in their learning, including children with special educational needs and/or those in need of further support. Meticulous monitoring and rigorous assessment ensure all children receive highly appropriate and meaningful support. Interventions are swiftly and successfully put into place to prevent children from falling behind their peers.
- The managers and staff work exceptionally well with health professionals and others involved in the children's learning. They share strategies such as visual learning cues and flash cards to support children's care and learning very effectively.
- Children are highly imaginative as they play. For example, they design and build complex structures with crates and chairs. They incorporate other resources, such as steering wheels and tickets, to enhance their game and develop storylines even further.
- Staff are skilled and knowledgeable and demonstrate strong teaching practice. They continuously engage in high-quality interactions and, as a result, children are very eager to learn.
- Parents' comments about the nursery are overwhelmingly positive. They share their experiences of the recently improved handover periods of the day, where the child's key person offers verbal details of the child's time at nursery and the progress they make in their learning.
- Children are incredibly happy and demonstrate kind and respectful behaviour. They have developed extremely strong attachments with the caring and nurturing staff. This has created a warm atmosphere throughout the setting.

# What the setting needs to do to improve further

#### To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

continue to enhance the already excellent strategies for engaging parents in contributing to nursery life and supporting their children's all-round learning and development.

## **Inspection activities**

- The inspector held meetings with the management team and the provider, and spoke with staff at appropriate times throughout the inspection.
- The inspector observed the quality of teaching and the impact this has on children's learning indoors and outside.
- The inspector spoke with children and parents and sampled parents' questionnaires to help take account of their views.
- The inspector completed two joint observations with one of the officers in charge.
- The inspector looked at a range of documentation, including records of children's progress, the nursery's self-evaluation and improvement plans, evidence of staff suitability, and policies and procedures.

# **Inspection findings**

### Effectiveness of leadership and management is outstanding

Safeguarding is effective. Staff have an excellent understanding of a wide range of factors that can affect children's well-being. Concerns about children's welfare are identified and responded to promptly, ensuring children's safety at all times. Robust and rigorous recruitment procedures are adhered to, ensuring the suitability of all staff employed. The managers are very well qualified and experienced childcare professionals. They ensure that they support staff superbly well. Staff comment that they feel highly respected and valued within their roles. Supervisory sessions are extremely effective at maintaining outstanding teaching across the nursery. Staff contribute and offer suggestions for new training experiences that will enhance their skills even further.

## Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is outstanding

Children are eager to join in with an abundance of exciting activities, inside and outside. Staff show a firm understanding of how children learn. They enable them to lead activities, making suggestions for them to take an active role in their learning. Staff skilfully question children to help to extend their language and creative thinking. Children are fascinated and delighted by the range of resources and demonstrate exceptional skills while they play. Innovative ideas, such as using hand-held metal detectors, help children to investigate and explore material properties as they hide and rediscover a range of objects, including play dough, toys, real money and keys, under bowls or within straw.

# Personal development, behaviour and welfare are outstanding

Staff are exemplary role models and children's behaviour is excellent. Children use their exceptional manners without being prompted by staff and show kindness and respect towards their friends. For example, they politely ask their friends if they can have a turn during shared games. This is down to the nurturing, motivated and enthusiastic staff, who create a warm, exciting environment for all the children. All children develop a positive sense of self and their place in the world. For instance, they express great joy as they share personal experiences with each other about Easter activities and family holidays abroad. Children are highly capable at managing their own needs, including showing very good independent hygiene routines.

# **Outcomes for children are outstanding**

Staff are dedicated to ensuring children reach their full potential. Children are highly self-motivated and confident learners. They settle quickly when they arrive at nursery, recognise their own names and are keen problem-solvers. For example, younger children demonstrate exceptional levels of perseverance as they attempt to build towers from mirrored shaped blocks. Older children express fascination and delight as they experiment to see which objects float or sink and work out why this happens. Children demonstrate superb collaboration in their play, form firm friendships and develop excellent social skills. All children make excellent progress in relation to their starting points and are learning key skills in readiness for the next stage in their learning.
