

Compliance action taken for childcare provision

Summary of outcome

All early years providers must meet the legal requirements in the 'Statutory framework for the early years foundation stage', which you can find at www.gov.uk/government/publications/early-years-foundation-stage-framework--2. If we find that a provider is not meeting the requirements, we can take action to ensure they put matters right.

On 2 May 2019 we carried out a monitoring visit to ensure that the provider had taken action to meet the welfare requirements notice actions set at her previous inadequate with enforcement inspection. The report is published on the Ofsted website and the welfare requirement notice was served on 25 April 2019.

At the visit, we found that the provider had taken appropriate action to put some of the matters right. For example, the provider has undertaken some training to improve her knowledge and understanding of the early years foundation stage (EYFS). She has also adapted children's menus to ensure that meals provided for children are healthy and that water is available and accessible for children. There were no behaviour issues observed at the visit. The provider explained that following training on behaviour management, she updated her knowledge and skills regarding strategies for managing children's behaviour. The provider shared that she has developed new systems for recording children's daily hours of attendance.

At this visit, we identified that the provider continues to fail to ensure that her assistants have appropriate induction training to understand their duties and responsibilities when caring for children. The provider continues to fail in respect of having an effective keyperson system to ensure that children receive good quality of care and learning experiences. The provider does not ensure there are arrangements in place to support children with special educational needs and/or disabilities. She continues to not share information from parents, carers and other professionals working with children, in order to provide children with the continuous support they need. It was also observed that the provider continues to fail to plan challenging and enjoyable experiences for children. She is yet to develop systems for the observation and assessment of their skills and progress. Additionally, the provider



fails to have effective systems in place to ensure that all persons who live or work at the provision and who are likely to have regular contact with children are suitable. Furthermore, she does not deploy her assistants effectively to ensure that children are always safe. The next step will be a re-inspection. The provider remains registered with Ofsted.
