The quality and purpose of care standard is that children receive care from staff who—

The protection of children standard is that children are protected from harm and enabled to keep themselves safe.

In particular, the standard in paragraph (1) requires the registered person to ensure that staff—

assess whether each child is at risk of harm, taking into account information in the child's relevant plans, and, if necessary, make arrangements to reduce the risk of any harm to the child;

help each child to understand how to keep safe;

have the skills to identify and act upon signs that a child is at risk of harm;

understand the roles and responsibilities in relation to protecting children that are assigned to them by the registered person;

take effective action whenever there is a serious concern about a child's welfare; and

that the home's day-to-day care is arranged and delivered so as to keep each child safe and to protect each child effectively from harm; and

that the effectiveness of the home's child protection policies is monitored regularly.



(Regulation 12 (1)(2)(a)(i)(ii)(iii)(v)(vi)(b)(e)) 20: Restraint and deprivation of liberty Restraint in relation to a child is only permitted for the purpose of preventing— injury to any person (including the child); or serious damage to the property of any person (including the child). Inspection judgements

Overall experiences and progress of children and young people: inadequate

Leaders and managers have failed to appoint a suitable person to lead and manage this home. Requirements from the previous inspection are not met. Weaknesses in how well children are helped and protected mean that their welfare is not safeguarded. These critical issues impact negatively on the experiences and progress of children.

Targets and goals do not link effectively to children's placement plans or to their education, health and care plans. Consequently, children are not making enough progress with achieving independence and the skills for adult life. Care and positive behaviour plans along with risk assessments do not always include important information. This potentially places children at risk and impacts negatively on their progress.

Staff do not review children's individual needs or plans to determine what progress they are making. Risk assessments are not regularly updated. Staff do not provide children with individual care that meets their current needs. Consequently, children continue to use poor-quality plastic plates and cutlery when they may no longer need to. Children do not have access to the rear garden without asking staff, and closed-circuit television (CCTV) remains in bedrooms used by children who do not require this level of supervision. This impacts negatively on children's dignity and privacy, particularly the inappropriate use of CCTV.

New children have moved into the home without enough consideration of how their needs will be met and whether there will be any impact on the children already living there. Overall, relationships between staff and children are positive. Children enjoy activities such as swimming, visiting theme parks and shopping. However, staff lack strong leadership to ensure that they are ambitious for children and that opportunities are built on to help children to achieve positive outcomes.

How well children and young people are helped and protected: inadequate

Children are not effectively protected from harm. Disclosures made by a child have not been acted on or shared with external safeguarding agencies as required. In addition, a serious allegation made about the home was not reported to Ofsted in accordance with the regulations.

Child protection policies have not been reviewed since the ownership of the home changed. Staff have not received adequate safeguarding disabled children training. Child protection records are not well maintained, and the actions and outcomes of concerns are unclear. These critical weaknesses do not ensure that children are well supported, protected and cared for.

Leaders and managers have not ensured that specialised equipment to move and lift children is safe to use. The manager is unaware of what equipment has had the required



servicing. This is a serious safeguarding concern.

Leaders and managers told the inspector that restraint is not used in the home. Nevertheless, some children's records indicate that restraint may have been used, for example staff holding children's wrists during incidents. Not all staff have been trained to use restraint. It is of concern that staff do not recognise what constitutes a restraint. Leaders and managers are not challenging or recognising weak practice. This leaves children at potential risk of harm.

Staff do not receive effective support to write good-quality records about children's behaviour. Information available to leaders and managers is insufficient to enable them to evaluate the quality of care effectively. Ineffective monitoring and oversight of records puts children at risk.

The effectiveness of leaders and managers: inadequate

This home is not led and managed effectively. Weaknesses in the home are widespread and serious. The registered manager left their position in June 2017. Senior leaders have not ensured that effective management arrangements have been in place since this time. A new manager has recently been appointed.

Leaders' and managers' monitoring and oversight of the quality of care is poor. They do not scrutinise incidents effectively and have failed to identify concerns and report them to external professionals. Leaders and managers do not fully understand the strengths and weaknesses of the home. Senior leaders do not have effective development plans in place to address the weaknesses and improve the quality of care for children.

Reports completed by the independent visitor are not provided to Ofsted in the required timescales. Without these reports, the regulator is unable to monitor the performance of the home effectively.

Staff are not provided with the essential training and supervision that they need to support them to care for children effectively. None of the staff have the required childcare qualification. However, staff have very recently been enrolled to start this qualification. Supervision is not regular, and staff do not have their performance appraised at least annually.

Information about this inspection

Inspectors have looked closely at the experiences and progress of children and young people. Inspectors considered the quality of work and the differences made to the lives of children and young people. They watched how professional staff work with children and young people and each other and discussed the effectiveness of help and care provided. Wherever possible, they talked to children and young people and their families. In addition, the inspectors have tried to understand what the children's home knows about how well it is performing, how well it is doing and what difference it is



making for the children and young people whom it is trying to help, protect and look after.

Using the 'Social care common inspection framework', this inspection was carried out under the Care Standards Act 2000 to assess the effectiveness of the service, how it meets the core functions of the service as set out in legislation, and to consider how well it complies with the Children's Homes (England) Regulations 2015 and the 'Guide to the children's homes regulations including the quality standards'.
