Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- The childminder understands how children learn and completes effective observations and assessments. She knows the children well and provides exciting activities that support children in reaching the next steps in their learning.
- Children develop secure attachments with the childminder. They are relaxed and happy in her care. They frequently interact with the childminder and invite her to join their play.
- The childminder supports children to develop good communication skills. She listens carefully to children and uses questions to engage them in conversations. Children are eager to communicate and share their knowledge.
- The childminder has established strong relationships with parents. They are kept well informed about their children's care and progress. Parents speak highly of the childminder and praise the good progress their children make.
- The childminder provides a variety of toys and activities to help older children independently choose what they want to do throughout the day. Occasionally, she does not always recognise when she can further promote younger children's independence in exploring sensory resources.
- The childminder has attended mandatory training to ensure that children are able to play in a safe and secure environment. However, she has not targeted professional development opportunities to help raise her teaching skills to the highest level.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- strengthen opportunities for younger children to become more independent when exploring sensory resources
- sharpen the focus on professional development opportunities, to help raise the already good quality of teaching to the highest possible level.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities indoors and assessed the impact it has on children's learning.
- The inspector completed a joint evaluation of an activity with the childminder.
- The inspector held a number of discussions with the childminder. She looked at relevant documentation and evidence of the suitability of persons living in the household.
- The inspector took account of the views of parents through written feedback provided.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of leadership and management is good

Safeguarding is effective. The childminder understands her responsibility to keep children safe. She has a secure understanding of how to refer any concerns she may have about children's welfare. Regular risk assessments of the childminder's home protect children from harm. The childminder works in partnership with other settings and early years professionals. This helps to meet children's care and learning needs. She tracks children's development and identifies ways to close any emerging gaps in their learning. This helps all children make good progress from their starting points.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

The childminder possesses good teaching skills. She engages well with children to support their learning. She promotes children's early literacy and mathematical understanding well. For example, she encourages children to find numbers and letters hidden in a large sand tray. Children delight in discovering the individual letters and numbers. The childminder supports children to identify the numbers and make the letter sounds. She builds on children's interests as the activity progresses. The childminder inspires children to think about and use their own ideas in their play. For instance, she provides different animals for children to hide as they develop their own games. The childminder offers children a wealth of opportunities to enjoy reading. Children listen intently to stories. They enjoy discussing their understanding of these with the childminder.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

The childminder is a good role model. She encourages good manners. She regularly praises children, building on their self-esteem and emotional well-being. Behaviour is good. Children quickly learn to share and take turns with toys and resources. They learn to respect and be kind to one another. Children share books. The childminder encourages them to talk about how the different characters might feel. Children have many opportunities to learn about healthy lifestyles. They go on regular trips to the park, developing their physical skills. They learn about good hygiene routines, such as the importance of washing their hands before eating. Children have good opportunities to visit places of interest in their local community. This supports children in developing their understanding of the world around them.

Outcomes for children are good

Children are keen to take part in new learning experiences. They are busy and motivated learners. They show good levels of concentration during their chosen activities. The skills and knowledge children develop, prepare them well for the next stage of their learning. Children have many opportunities for mark making. This helps to prepare them well for early writing. Children learn to manage their self-care needs and express themselves confidently.
