Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is outstanding

- The management team are highly ambitious and support staff in aiming for the highest quality education for all children. Managers are actively involved in the daily routine. They are excellent role models and inspire their team to be the best teachers they can.
- The nursery has a highly positive atmosphere as staff skilfully focus in on what sparks children's interests and plan the best possible environment to motivate their learning.
- Relationships throughout this nursery are strong and secure. Staff give babies lots of cuddles and reassurance. Toddlers seek support when needed and older children are extremely friendly. Children settle-in well and develop very strong social skills, which will stand them in good stead in their future lives.
- Valuing individuals lies at the heart of this highly stimulating nursery and outcomes for all children are extremely positive. The support for children with special educational needs and/or disabilities is superb. Staff ensure the environment is welcoming, stimulating and safe for all children. They provide the best possible opportunities for all children to make excellent progress in readiness for starting school.
- Managers and staff are extremely supportive to children and their families. They attend meetings with outside agencies and place the needs of children at the heart of what they do. Parents speak very highly of the support they receive. They comment on the excellent progress their children make because of the caring staff team.
- Children are exceptionally confident and are extremely enthusiastic to learn. They motivate one another by exchanging ideas and sharing the excellent range of toys and resources. Their positive self-esteem shows that they feel valued. For example, they tell staff that they have had an excellent idea and that they know the best way to try things. The strong culture of respect across this nursery is inspirational.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

consider how the procedures for evaluating staff practice could be developed even further by using a wider range of approaches.

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching and the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector sampled planning and assessment records and a range of other documents.
- The inspector conducted a joint observation with the nursery manager.
- The inspector spoke to children, parents and staff to consider their views on the nursery.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of leadership and management is outstanding

Safeguarding is effective. Staff are very clear about their responsibilities to keep children safe. They attend a range of training courses that enable them to develop excellent skills. For example, they attend training on new approaches for planning for children's learning. There have been other significant changes since the last inspection that demonstrate a continuous drive for excellence. For example, the outdoor forest area has been developed, which provides children with daily opportunities to learn in a natural environment. Managers have a sharp overview of the progress children make. They identify when groups of children need additional support and take proactive action to address this. For example, they adapt the outside area to create quiet and small spaces for younger children. Consequently, all children are equally included in the superb range of activities and all make excellent progress.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is outstanding

Staff are talented teachers who inspire all children to have a go and try new things. There is an abundant range of activities within the nursery and in the outside areas, across all age groups. For example, babies delight in exploring the wide range of sensory toys and toddlers develop strong physical skills as they learn to climb, run and cycle. Staff take every opportunity to teach children in a natural, but intuitive way. For example, they identify when children are interested in specific stories and help them to build themed areas in the forest. They skilfully motivate children's imagination, incorporating mathematics and literacy at the same time. Children learn to count, measure and compare as they have fun. They delight in their ability to recognise words and have a go at forming letters. Therefore, they develop a range of highly valuable skills in readiness for starting school.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are outstanding

Safety is at the heart of activities and staff take every opportunity to teach children about their own well-being. For example, they teach children about safety and remind them of the purpose of safety rules. They balance this with providing opportunities for children to take safe risks. This approach is highly effective and benefits all children. For example, children climb low-level trees, but explain to visitors that they must know their own limits and stay safe. Staff are extremely caring towards children and their families and this results in a strong community feel across the nursery.

Outcomes for children are outstanding

Babies settle quickly due to the well-thought-out settling-in arrangements. They seek physical comfort from staff when needed and soon develop confidence to crawl off and explore. Toddlers are very independent and learn to dress themselves and manage their cutlery at mealtimes. They share very well with one another and learn social skills from a young age. Older children are exceptionally confident and friendly. They bubble with enthusiasm to tell visitors about the activities they enjoy at the nursery. For example, they talk about their monthly visits to a local care home and the people they meet. The limitless opportunities for learning enable all children to make the best possible progress in their development. This provides an outstanding start to their education.

Apples Nursery registered in 1998. The nursery is owned by Saga Group and caters exclusively for families employed by Saga Group. It is situated in Sandgate near Folkestone, Kent. The nursery is open Monday to Friday from 8.30am to 6pm, all year round. The nursery is in receipt of funding for the provision of free early education for two-, three- and four-year-old children. The nursery employs 34 staff, of whom 29 hold appropriate early years qualifications at level 3 or above.
