Summary of key findings for parents

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder has knowledge of how to evaluate the provision to identify the strengths and areas for development. She knows how to gather feedback from parents and children to reflect and improve her practice.
- The childminder understands the importance of keeping children safe. She is aware of child protection issues and wider safeguarding issues. She knows the procedures to report concerns and allegations against adults, to the relevant authorities.
- The childminder knows how to observe and assess children's learning. She describes a range of opportunities, both indoors and outside, that she intends to plan for them to enjoy and make progress.
- The childminder recognises the importance of working in partnerships with parents to share information about children's interests and needs, to identify their starting points and to help children settle.
- The childminder knows how to create a positive environment. She describes how she intends to promote positive behaviour and support children to learn right from wrong.
- The childminder has knowledge of British Values and she knows how to promote equality and diversity in her practice.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to provide activities and experiences that support children's learning.
- The inspector looked at the childminder's policies and documents that she intends to use when caring for children.
- The inspector discussed the childminder's processes for self-evaluation and her improvement plan.
- The inspector viewed resources and had a tour of the areas of the childminder's home that she intends to use for childminding.
