Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- The manager and staff are dedicated to raising the quality of the nursery further. They have a range of strategies in place to take account of the views of parents, staff and children. The manager sets ambitious targets to help to improve. For example, she has recently enhanced the physical development opportunities for children, using external training and support for all staff. This has helped to deepen their understanding of how young children acquire physical skills.
- The key-person system is effective. Caring staff take time to get to know all children and their families. Children settle well in the homely environment. They display strong emotional well-being and confidence and are very happy.
- Children demonstrate high levels of independence. Babies persevere when feeding themselves. Older children wait patiently and take turns to self-serve from food trolleys, using assorted utensils.
- Staff support children's learning and development well. They carefully plan resources and activities to meet children's individual needs and promote their next steps in learning.
- Partnerships with parents are strong. Staff keep them informed and successfully involve them in their children's learning. Staff share ideas with parents so that they can support learning further. For example, parents are invited to take kits to grow sunflowers and make dough at home. Parents comment positively and say that the nursery is a 'true home away from home'.
- Occasionally, staff do not extend questioning to allow children to think through their own ideas and deepen their learning.
- Staff do not always reinforce children's awareness and understanding of how to stay healthy.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- further develop the questioning techniques used by staff to extend children's critical thinking
- enhance children's understanding of staying healthy and provide more consistent explanations of the importance of positive health and hygiene practices.

Inspection activities

- The inspector toured all areas of the nursery. She spoke to children and parents, and took account of their views.
- The inspector spoke with staff and children at appropriate times during the inspection. She observed activities in the indoor and outdoor areas in order to assess the impact these have on children's learning.
- The inspector held several meetings with the nursery manager. She looked at relevant documentation including evidence of the suitability of staff, children's records, risk assessment and self evaluation.
- The inspector sampled children's development information and records.
- The inspector took account of the views of parents through discussions and written feedback provided.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of leadership and management is good

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. All staff complete regular safeguarding training. They have a clear knowledge of the procedures to follow to keep children safe in their care. Robust policies and procedures are embedded and understood by all staff. For example, they complete risk assessments and daily checks. This helps staff to identify and minimise any potential hazards and enables children to explore the environment safely. The manager recruits and monitors staff effectively. She provides good support through regular supervision sessions and relevant professional development opportunities. This ensures that the already good quality of teaching and learning across the nursery is improving.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Children play and explore in bright and well-organised environments that support all areas of learning. Staff ensure that there are plenty of experiences that enable children to explore using their senses. For example, babies enjoy experimenting with paint to create unique sunflowers on paper. Older children make dough independently, using various scents and flavours. Staff work together well and successfully implement ideas that prioritise children's learning needs and interests. For example, staff working with older children use a visual timetable to support consistent routines. Children are making good progress. Staff support children's communication and language skills well. For example, very young children stop and take part in peek-a-boo games when their name is called. Older children share stories and develop good listening skills. Staff plan ample experiences for children to practise their physical skills. For instance, younger babies crawl freely and explore objects with their mouths. Older children enjoy walks to the park and kick footballs in the garden. This helps them to develop good hand-to-eye coordination and muscle control.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Staff are very sensitive towards children's needs and are effective at supporting their emotional well-being. For example, staff support babies to separate from their comforters, while toddlers seek cuddles from staff when they wake up. Children show a strong sense of self-esteem. They have many opportunities to make choices. For example, mealtimes are social occasions as children choose from a wide range of nutritional food. Behaviour is good. For example, children wait patiently for their turn and learn manners, and older children chat happily with their friends. Staff encourage children to collaborate and share ideas during their play. For example, children use a hose pipe in the garden to make muddy puddles to jump in. They squeal with delight as the water splashes them, learning new words, such as 'more' and 'fast'.

Outcomes for children are good

Children make good progress in their learning from their starting points, including those who need extra help. Children develop skills needed for the next stage in their learning and their eventual move to school. They engage in activities with enthusiasm and all children enjoy learning. For example, babies listen to stories intently, while older children identify the letters in their names and recognise these letters in other words.

Home from Home Kidz Care Ltd registered in 2013. There are 10 members of childcare staff. Of these, five hold appropriate early years qualifications at level 2, three hold level 3 and one holds level 6. The nursery opens, Monday to Friday, all year round. Sessions are from 7am until 6pm. The nursery receives funding for the provision of free early education for two-, three- and four-year-old children.
