Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is outstanding

- The inspirational senior management team creates a highly focused ethos, which is reflected in the positive attitudes of staff, parents and children. Meeting children's care, well-being and learning needs is central to all that they do. Staff and parents develop excellent partnership working to secure the best possible outcomes for children.
- The head of centre and nursery manager oversee the running of the nursery exceedingly well. They meticulously monitor every aspect of the nursery and make changes which quickly drive forward impressive improvements.
- The senior management team has a remarkable attitude towards staff development and well-being. For example, they support staff through robust observations, supervisions and appraisals. They plan training that is precisely linked to the needs of the children in their care. Managers ensure that staff's knowledge and skills are fully embedded as part of their high-quality teaching.
- Staff have the highest expectations for children's development. The learning environment is filled with stimulating and imaginative resources and learning opportunities, both inside and outside. Children's interests are central to learning and themes are embedded in activities which stimulate the children.
- Children develop exceptionally strong bonds with staff, who are highly perceptive to their needs. Children show that they feel secure. Babies settle extremely quickly. The secure environment helps older children to develop their own independence and become confident to express their views and make choices.
- Children are extremely confident and self-assured. They are remarkably well prepared for their next stage of learning and eventual move on to school.
- Staff provide parents with excellent ongoing support and a wealth of information and ideas to help them to continue their children's learning at home.
- Children thoroughly enjoy spending time outdoors in the beautiful garden and are given excellent opportunities to be physically active and explore nature.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

continue to develop the already highly effective observation and planning systems to promote further the very highest level of outcomes for children.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities indoors and outdoors, and assessed the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector spoke with children and staff at appropriate times during the inspection.
- The inspector completed joint observations with the head of centre and nursery manager.
- The inspector held a meeting with the centre manager and head of centre and looked at relevant documentation and evidence of the suitability of staff working in the nursery.
- The inspector spoke with several parents during the inspection and took account of their views.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of leadership and management is outstanding

Managers monitor children's development continually and swiftly identify gaps in children's learning. Highly effective partnerships with other professionals, such as family support workers, help them plan early interventions for children. Managers recognise that they wish to further develop the range of highly successful interventions that they offer. Safeguarding is effective. Staff have an excellent understanding of the signs and symptoms of abuse. They know what to do should they have a concern about children's welfare. Staff minimise risks to children in their environment exceptionally well. They deploy themselves effectively as children move between the inside and outside spaces. This helps to keep children safe.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is outstanding

Staff are well qualified and have an excellent knowledge of how children learn. Younger children's sensory play is exceptionally well supported. For example, they are confident and self-assured as they use their hands and fingers to make marks in the sand. Staff encourage them to use tools, such as magnifying glasses, to examine the objects they find in the sand. Children learn extensively about their local community and wider world. For instance, they visit local amenities such as the wetland centre and go on trips further afield to explore children's interests around castles and bridges. High regard is given to developing children's communication skills. Staff consistently model language effectively and provide an engaging narrative to play, repeating vocabulary and extending sentences.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are outstanding

Very strong settling-in practices are in place. Staff work hard to establish exceptional strong bonds with children. They gather comprehensive information from parents during home visits to ensure that children's individual needs are well known prior to them starting. Staff are excellent role models. They provide sensitive and nurturing support remarkably well. As a result, children play well together, form secure friendships with their peers and show care and concern for others. Children learn about healthy lifestyles. For example, they grow their own vegetables in the allotment garden and get plenty of exercise, such as using the Jabadao gym to build on their core strength.

Outcomes for children are outstanding

All children, including those with special educational needs and/or disabilities, make superb progress. They are exceptionally well prepared for their future learning. Children investigate and ask questions about the natural world. For example, they talk about the features of the insects they find in the garden. Children take risks and learn about how to keep themselves safe. Children develop impressive literacy skills. Younger children hold pencils with the correct grip and older children use their knowledge of sounds and letters to write words to express their ideas.
