Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- The nursery's safeguarding policy does not include a clear explanation of the action to take in the event of an allegation against staff, as required. Some staff are not able to describe the action they would take if there was an allegation. This puts children at potential risk of harm.
- Records about children, particularly when there are concerns about their welfare, are not detailed enough to keep children safe.
- Staff do not provide children with the nutrition they need to be healthy. For example, many meals are high in processed foods and do not contain enough vegetables.
- The provider continues to fail to use self-evaluation to help identify weaknesses in the provision and make necessary improvements.
- Staff interrupt young children's learning to change their nappy, unnecessarily, to fit in with the routine. Older children are required to sleep in the afternoon, whether or not they are tired, in order to create a quiet environment for younger children who do want to sleep. This does not meet children's individual developmental needs.
- Staff do not provide enough challenge for children, through the activities and care they provide for children, and their interactions with them.

It has the following strengths

- Staff offer a welcoming environment that is inviting for both children and parents. Wellorganised displays for parents provide them with information on what their child is learning and how children develop. This helps to promote continuous learning at home.
- Children have daily access to outdoor activities at the nursery and in the local community. They enjoy playing in the rain and splashing in puddles.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

The provision is inadequate and Ofsted intends to take enforcement action:

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of leadership and management is inadequate

Safeguarding is ineffective. Since the last inspection, those responsible for safeguarding have received training to be able to carry out their role and support staff with safeguarding matters. However, training has not been effective as some staff do not know the correct procedures to follow if there is an allegation made against a staff member. Also, the nursery's safeguarding policy and procedures do not detail the procedures to follow so that staff can refer to the policy should the need arise. The provider has implemented new procedures for when children have unexplained bruising. However, staff do not record sufficient detail about the injury to adequately safeguard children and share with other agencies if necessary. The provider has taken some action to address the weaknesses from the last inspection, such as removing hazards in the bathroom. However, self-evaluation remains weak. The provider does not accurately identify weaknesses in the quality of care and learning, particularly in relation to how the routines of the nursery meet children's individual needs.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment requires improvement

The quality of teaching is inconsistent across the nursery. Some staff do not have high enough expectations of children to move them on to the next stage in their learning. For example, some conversations and activities with more-able children are too basic to challenge their thinking. Resources and activities, both indoors and outdoors, are stimulating and inviting. Children develop their imaginations in the 'cake shop'. They practise their physical skills, for example, when they use the tweezers to pick 'treasure' out of the sand. However, some children, particularly younger and quieter children, spend long periods without any engagement with others and not involved in play or learning. Staff make regular observations and assessments of children's progress, which parents contribute to. However, records of information provided by parents about what children can do at home are not always used effectively to progress children's development. For example, when children are reported to be able to use a potty at home, this is not supported and progressed within the nursery.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

The weaknesses in safeguarding compromise children's safety and welfare. Routines, such as those for sleeping and changing nappies, do not meet children's individual care and learning needs. Children behave well and learn how to keep themselves safe. They enjoy regular outdoor activity when they play in the large, well-resourced garden and on visits to the local park. This helps to keep them healthy and active. However, staff do not know enough about how to provide healthy food for children. As a result, meals are high in carbohydrates and salt, and lack the balance and nutrition that children need.

Outcomes for children require improvement

Most children make good progress from their starting points. They learn skills to develop independence in readiness for school. For example, children use knives and forks at lunchtime and cut their own food. However, the weaknesses in the routine and the quality of teaching mean that some children, particularly those exceeding outcomes for the early years foundation stage, do not make as much progress as they could.

Dolphin Day Nursery registered in 2014. It operates from church premises in Morden, within the London Borough of Sutton. It is open each weekday for 51 weeks of the year. Sessions are from 8am to 6pm. The nursery employs six members of staff; of these, two hold a foundation degree, three hold relevant childcare qualifications and one is unqualified.
