Information about this children's home

The home is owned by a private company. It is registered to provide care and accommodation for up to five children or young people who have emotional and/or behavioural difficulties.

The registered manager post has been vacant since 24 April 2019.

This monitoring visit

This monitoring visit was undertaken to follow up concerns following complaints received by Ofsted about potential breaches in regulation. The inspector subsequently found failings in the way that children and young people are safeguarded in the home.

Consequently, two further requirements have been issued to ensure that the home's leadership and management team makes immediate improvements to keep children and young people safe.

Children and young people cannot access external areas of the premises freely and without restriction. The locking of external doors and, in some rooms, the windows does not ensure the health and well-being of children and young people in the home.

Monitoring of the home is ineffective. The provider has failed to ensure that the external monitoring effectively safeguards children and young people and that the conduct of the home promotes children's and young people's well-being.

Since the previous inspection, the provider has appointed a new manager. However, she has only been in post for four days before this monitoring visit and so has not

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had time to address shortfalls in practice.

The concerns raised have been addressed through this monitoring visit. The leadership and management have met with local councillors and representatives from the local community. This is to ensure that the home's purpose is transparent and to strengthen community relationships.

Staffing of the home is being supported by recruitment of two additional care staff, subject to appropriate checks being completed. Additionally, a maintenance worker is in the process of being appointed, also subject to necessary safer recruitment checks. The provider has ceased the practice of using agency staff, thus providing children and young people with continuity of care.

The judgement was not changed at this monitoring visit. However, two new requirements have been made. Three requirements from the recent full inspection on 7 May 2019 are in progress and repeated here, along with the recommendations. Two of the previous requirements are met.

Statutory requirements

In particular, the registered person must ensure that children have access to external areas.	
When the independent person is carrying out a visit, the registered person must help the independent visitor-	25/07/2019
if they consent, to interview in private such of the children, their parents, relatives and persons working at the home as the independent person requires; and	
to inspect the premises of the home and such of the home's records (except for a child's case records, unless the child and the child's placing authority consent) as the independent person requires.	
The independent person must produce a report about a visit ('the independent person's report') which sets out, in particular, the independent person's opinion as to whether-	
children are effectively safeguarded; and the conduct of the home promotes children's well-being.	
The independent person's report may recommend actions that the registered person may take in relation to the home and timescales within which the registered person must consider whether or not to take those actions. (Regulation $44(2)(a)(b)(4)(a)(b)(5)$)	
In particular, the independent person must make a rigorous and impartial assessment of the home's arrangements for safeguarding and promoting the welfare of the children in the home's care.	

Recommendations

■ Staff must help each child to prepare for any moves from the home, whether they are returning home, moving to another placement, or to live independently. This includes supporting the child to develop emotional and mental resilience to cope without the home's support and, where the child is moving to live independently, practical skills such as cooking, housework, budgeting and personal self-care. ('Guide to the children's homes regulations including the quality standards', page 17, paragraph 3.27)



In particular, staff should maintain an individual record with the young person, which they can take with them to support their development to adulthood. Steps should be taken to ensure that tasks and information include relevant practical knowledge required to support independence.

■ The registered person should have a workforce plan which can fulfil the workforce related requirements of regulation 16, schedule 1 (paragraphs 19 and 20). The plan should be updated to include any new training and qualifications completed by staff while working at the home, and used to record the ongoing training and continuing professional developmental needs of staff - including the home's manager. ('Guide to the children's homes regulations including the quality standards', page 53, paragraph 10.8)
