Information about this children's home

The service specialises in providing planned and managed therapeutic interventions for children who have suffered early life trauma. There is an acting manager in post who is not yet registered with Ofsted.

Inspection date: 17 June 2019

This monitoring visit

Following the inadequate judgment in April 2019, Ofsted carried out a monitoring inspection of the home. This was to monitor the progress in meeting the two compliance notices and eight requirements.

This visit found that only four requirements and one compliance notice have been met. This has left four requirements and one compliance notice still unmet.

Although leaders and managers have made some improvements, this work has been too slow, and risks to the young person remain. Where improvements have been made, these are not yet embedded into staff practice.

Despite the home having been issued a compliance notice setting out the necessary actions required in regard to the young person's risk assessments, shortfalls remain. Risk assessments are still missing management strategies for staff to follow in the way that they safeguard the young person. This absence of detail creates the risk of inconsistent practice.

Although work has now been carried out to address actions identified in the fire risk assessment, not all members of staff have read the document.

Staff have still not received the necessary training to help them to understand the young person's needs and risks. Therefore, staff have not been able to complete the necessary work with the young person to help him to safely manage his emotions

and associated behavioural traits.

Although there is now a new management team, none of the new managers has received an induction to the home.

Staff are beginning to receive supervision that is of good quality. There is a new therapist working with the staff, who is beginning to help them to reflect on their practice. These are early days, but the staff are beginning to be helped to understand the therapeutic approaches the young person requires.

The young person is now living in a clean home after managers have re-invested in the property.

The statement of purpose has now been sent to Ofsted in line with regulation.

As a result of this visit, the home was issued with a further compliance notice. The restriction of accommodation notice remains in place. Ofsted will continue to closely monitor the service.
