## Summary of key findings for parents

### This provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands how to plan and provide a broad range of activities and learning opportunities. She knows how to tailor these to take into account children's ages and abilities.
- The childminder has an appropriate knowledge of safeguarding and the signs of abuse and neglect. She understands the correct procedures to follow should she have concerns about a child in her care or if allegations are made about herself.
- The childminder maintains a current paediatric first-aid certificate. This means that she has up-to-date knowledge on how to meet the needs of children in the event of an accident.
- The childminder demonstrates a good understanding of the importance of forming strong attachments with the children and how to manage their behaviour.
- The childminder understands the value of continuous reflection on her practice and recommendations set at the last inspection have been implemented. This demonstrates the childminder's capacity to improve and to further develop the provision.
- The childminder is aware of how to promote children's knowledge of healthy lifestyles. She provides lots of outdoor experiences so that children have good opportunities to be active and get plenty of fresh air. The premises are welcoming and safe.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## **Inspection activities**

- The inspector talked with the childminder about her knowledge of the learning and development requirements, including arrangements for assessing children's progress.
- The inspector sampled a range of documents and discussed the records and policies the childminder uses for childminding.
- The inspector discussed the childminder's understanding of how to keep children safe.
- The inspector checked the spaces and range of resources used for childminding purposes, and discussed the evaluations that the childminder uses to plan for improvements.
