Summary of key findings for parents

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder demonstrates her good knowledge and understanding of the learning and development requirements for children. She is aware of her responsibility to observe and assess children's learning. She knows how to plan activities to engage children to help them to make progress.
- The childminder has a positive attitude towards promoting an inclusive service. For example, she describes how she will provide a range of dolls, cultural clothes and experiences representing children's backgrounds and disabilities, to help all children feel welcomed and valued.
- The childminder understands the importance of keeping children safe and from harm. She clearly explains the local procedures for reporting her concerns about a child's welfare.
- The childminder has accessed a range of training and regularly attends local network meetings. This helps the childminder to reflect on her practice and keep her knowledge and skills up to date.
- The childminder recognises the importance of teaching children how to develop healthy lifestyles. For example, she provides them with healthy food and daily opportunities for physical exercise.
- The childminder values the importance of working in partnership with parents and other professionals, to support children's overall care and learning needs.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector had a tour of all the parts of the premises used for the purpose of childminding.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder her understanding of requirements and how she will support children's learning and care.
- The inspector viewed relevant documentation, including the childminder's public liability insurance, safeguarding policy and procedures, and paediatric first-aid qualification.
