Summary of key findings for parents

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands her duty to keep children safe and has suitable arrangements and strategies in place to help her do this. She understands the signs and symptoms which may indicate a child's welfare is at risk and knows how to respond if she has concerns. She has made herself aware of how to recognise if a child may be at risk of being exposed to extreme views or behaviours.
- The childminder is clear in her understanding of the learning and development requirements of the early years foundation stage. She knows how to provide activities to support all areas of children's learning, and build on what they know and can do.
- The childminder provides a suitable environment for children's care. She understands the importance of building effective partnerships with parents and other professionals who may be involved in children's learning and development. The childminder can demonstrate how she would meet children's individual needs effectively.
- The childminder has carefully considered how she will evaluate her provision to maintain continuous improvement.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector viewed the premises, including the outdoor area, and resources that will be used for childminding.
- The inspector looked at documents the childminder will use when caring for children.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to deliver educational programmes for children.
- The inspector discussed self-evaluation with the childminder.
- The inspector checked the suitability of all adults living on the premises.

The childminder registered in 2013 and lives in Stoke Newington, in the London Borough of Hackney. She operates from 9am to 6pm for 48 weeks of the year, Monday to Friday. The childminder holds a relevant qualification at level 6.
