## Summary of key findings for parents

#### This provision meets requirements

- The childminder has a thorough understanding of the early years foundation stage. She discusses how she intends to help all children make the best possible progress and has a wide selection of exciting resources.
- The childminder knows how to gather information to help her meet children's individual care needs. She discusses how she intends to collect robust information from families to put plans in place to meet any specific needs. She prioritises children's health and emotional well-being.
- The childminder has robust plans for monitoring and assessing the progress children make. She values the importance of working in partnership with parents and explains how she will involve them in children's care and learning.
- The childminder has established effective partnerships with other professionals, such as teachers and local authority advisers. She is proactive in reflecting on her practice and continues to follow a highly effective programme of professional development.
- The childminder knows how to keep children safe and protect them from harm. She has robust procedures to follow if she has concerns about a child's welfare. The childminder discusses her procedures for medical emergencies and risk assessment.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

#### **Inspection activities**

- The inspector viewed the indoor and outdoor areas intended to be used by children.
- The inspector and childminder discussed the resources and equipment intended to be used with children.
- The inspector held discussions with the childminder about her knowledge and understanding of the safeguarding and welfare requirements.
- The inspector looked at relevant documentation, including evidence of suitability checks and training certificates.
