This provision meets requirements

- The childminder is confident in her understanding and awareness of safeguarding procedures. She is able to fully describe how to keep children safe from harm and protect them from danger. The childminder knows the procedures to follow to record and report any concerns about children's welfare.
- The childminder knows how to promote children's personal development, including encouraging positive behaviour, in order to help children learn right from wrong.
- The childminder understands how to form close partnerships with parents. For example, she values working together to help children settle and to promote their ongoing learning and development needs.
- The childminder recognises the significance of continuing her professional development. She works very closely with the local authority and other organisations to keep her knowledge up to date.
- The childminder understands the importance of evaluating her practice and environment to ensure that it works for the children in her care. The childminder plans activities that reflect children's interests and stage of development.
- The childminder completes risk assessments for all areas available to the children, including outings.
- The childminder remains up to date with first-aid and safeguarding training.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector had a tour of the indoor and outdoor areas, and viewed resources which will be accessed by the children.
- The inspector looked at a range of documentation, including evidence of the suitability of persons living in the home, safeguarding procedures, attendance records, accident and incident records, observations of children, qualifications and policies and procedures.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to provide activities and experiences that promote children's learning.
- The inspector took account of the views of parents by reading written comments and feedback.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder her processes for self-evaluation and improvement plan.
