# **Summary of key findings for parents**

## This provision is inadequate

- The childminder does not identify and remove all hazards that are a risk to children's safety indoors as changes occur throughout the day. This compromises children's safety and their well-being significantly.
- The childminder does not keep a written record of all accidents to support her to meet children's well-being and healthcare needs.
- The childminder does not keep a written record of all children's attendance to monitor their welfare.
- The childminder does not use her interactions with children or the activities she provides to support children's learning well in all areas, particularly their language development.

### It has the following strengths

- Children are happy and settled. They develop warm and trusting relationships with the childminder and play well with other children.
- The childminder evaluates some aspects of her provision to make improvements to children's learning experiences. For instance, she uses ideas from early years training programmes to develop children's physical skills further.

# What the setting needs to do to improve further

## The provision is inadequate and Ofsted intends to take enforcement action:

# **Inspection findings**

### Effectiveness of leadership and management is inadequate

Safeguarding is ineffective. The childminder does not identify and remove all the risks to children during the day. While she has removed most of the risks identified from the last inspection and checks her home is safe and secure before children arrive, she does not consistently monitor safety as changes happen indoors. This applies to electric extension leads and a plastic carrier bag left in play areas, which pose a significant risk to children. The childminder works with the local authority to improve her provision. For example, she now supervises children appropriately and keeps play spaces adequately clean. The childminder stores medication safely, obtains written permission to administer medication to children and records details of anything given. However, she has not made sufficient improvements to ensure she is meeting all requirements. The childminder understands her child protection role and responsibilities. This includes the signs that a child might be at risk of harm and the correct procedures to follow if she has concerns about a child's welfare. The childminder has an assistant registered to help in emergencies and ensures he is aware of the policies and procedures.

# Quality of teaching, learning and assessment requires improvement

The childminder observes and tracks children's progress and plans activities to support their next steps for learning. However, she does not use the activities or her interactions with younger children to support all areas of their learning effectively. For instance, she does not model language consistently to help these children pronounce words accurately and does not encourage children to talk and answer questions regularly. The childminder provides some challenges to support children's learning. For example, children learn to use tools in craft activities to cut materials efficiently, to develop their small-muscle skills. As they become more interested, she increases the choice of resources and materials to extend their creative play. Children use these to create junk models and to explore objects.

#### Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

The childminder's failure to remove all the risks to children indoors throughout the day compromises their safety. She does not keep a written record of all children's attendance to monitor their welfare or keep a written record of all accidents. This compromises children's well-being and healthcare needs. Children behave well. They learn to share and take turns, and older children include younger children kindly in their play. Children benefit from regular outdoor play and opportunities to develop physical skills. For example, they climb, slide and ride wheeled toys around the garden. Children learn good personal hygiene routines and the importance of sun safety.

#### **Outcomes for children require improvement**

Overall, children make expected progress for their age in most areas of development. However, some children lack consistent support and activities to help them make better progress with their language development. Most children gain some of the skills they need for their future learning. They engage when interested and develop independence as they learn to manage self-care tasks for themselves. Children benefit from activities in the community to learn about the world.
