Monitoring visit
Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

### Information about this children's home

The home can provide care for up to eight children and young adults. Its specialism is to provide care to children and young adults who have mental health difficulties and who self-harm.

The home is part of a large national private organisation. This organisation has its own clinical team.

The manager has been registered with Ofsted since January 2019.

The home is also registered with the Care Quality Commission.

### This monitoring visit

This children's home was judged inadequate at the full inspection on 23 and 24 July 2019. Following that inspection, one compliance notice was issued, namely Regulation 6: the quality and purpose of care standard. Seven statutory requirements were also set.

At this monitoring visit, the inspector found that sufficient action has been taken to meet the compliance notice. A further full inspection will take place to determine the progress against the requirements.

Immediately following the previous inspection, the provider submitted a request to voluntarily cancel their registration with Ofsted and remain solely registered with the Care Quality Commission. At the time of the monitoring visit, children continued to live in the home, and leaders and managers had no plan for how they would effectively implement their de-registration with Ofsted. This hinders their ability to fully achieve their statement of purpose.

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Action to improve the quality of the home is starting to take shape. Refurbishment has commenced and is ongoing. The relocation of the clinic room better promotes the privacy and dignity of children. Children told inspectors that they prefer the new layout of the home and have been involved in making decisions about the decor.

Sufficient progress has been made to enable understanding of the actions and outcomes of safeguarding referrals. The registered manager has prioritised the understanding of the progress of all open safeguarding referrals. These updates are communicated sensitively to children.

Leaders and managers have taken effective action to review the missing from home protocols. An agreement has been reached with other professionals about the responsibility of independent return home interviews. Despite this, inspectors found one occurrence where a child has been missing from home and no return home interview took place.

A full review of the referral, assessment and admission process is complete. New procedures detail how leaders and managers will consider the suitability of new children moving into the home. This includes they ways in which they will review the child's progress and escalate any concerns where they feel they can no longer meet the child's needs. The effectiveness of this review is yet to be tested, as no new children have moved into the home.

Leaders and managers have improved the protocols for the administration of controlled medication administered on an as-and-when-required basis (pro re nata). The review includes more information about the purpose of the medication and child's health needs.

achieve the health and well-being outcomes that are recorded in the child's relevant plans. (Regulation 10 (1)(a)(b)(c) and (2)(a)(i))	
12: The protection of children standard	30/10/2019
The protection of children standard is that children are protected from harm and enabled to keep themselves safe.	
In particular, the standard in paragraph (1) requires the registered person to ensure that staff—	
assess whether each child is at risk of harm, taking into account information in the child's relevant plans, and, if necessary, make arrangements to reduce the risk of any harm to the child;	
help each child to understand how to keep safe;	
understand the roles and responsibilities in relation to protecting children that are assigned to them by the registered person;	
take effective action whenever there is a serious concern about a child's welfare; and	
that the home's day-to-day care is arranged and delivered so as to keep each child safe and to protect each child effectively from harm. (Regulation 12 (1)(2)(a)(i)(ii)(v)(vi) and (b))	
13: The leadership and management standard	30/10/2019
The leadership and management standard is that the registered person enables, inspires and leads a culture in relation to the children's home that—	
helps children aspire to fulfil their potential; and promotes their welfare.	
In particular, the standard in paragraph (1) requires the registered person to—	
lead and manage the home in a way that is consistent with the approach and ethos, and delivers the outcomes, set out in the home's statement of purpose;	



ensure that staff have the experience, qualifications and skills to meet the needs of each child;	
understand the impact that the quality of care provided in the home is having on the progress and experiences of each child and use this understanding to inform the development of the quality of care provided in the home;	
use monitoring and review systems to make continuous improvements in the quality of care provided in the home. (Regulation 13 $(1)(a)(b)$ and $(2)(a)(c)(f)(h)$ )
