Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands how to provide a safe environment for children. She is aware of the signs that might cause concern about a child's welfare and how to seek advice from relevant professionals.
- The childminder understands the need to provide children with experiences that suit their individual interests, preferences and learning needs. She has a secure knowledge and understanding of how young children learn and how to promote the learning and development of children of different ages, abilities and backgrounds.
- The childminder recognises the importance of partnership working with parents and other providers to promote consistency in children's care and learning.
- The childminder understands the importance of reflecting on her practice to identify and address areas for development to help continually improve her service. For example, the childminder is installing an additional bathroom downstairs for children's use.
- The childminder knows how to use observations and assessments to effectively plan for children's individual needs and provide a challenging range of experiences to help children make progress.
- The childminder understands the importance of creating a welcoming environment. For example, she has toys, equipment and resources to meet the learning needs of different age groups of children.
- The childminder shows appropriate understanding of how to help children learn about diversity. She is confident about teaching children right from wrong and in tackling negative stereotypes.
- The childminder is a good role model. She provides consistent, gentle reminders to support children's understanding of rules and boundaries and knows how to supports children's behaviour.
- The childminder has a comprehensive range of policies and procedures, including risk assessments, to help her manage her provision and guide her practice.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
