## Summary of key findings

### This provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder does not have an up-to-date knowledge of all safeguarding concerns relevant to her practice.
- The childminder demonstrates her understanding of the learning and development requirements. She explains how she uses observation and assessment to provide a stimulating curriculum for children.
- The childminder discusses how she uses self-evaluation effectively to identify and target areas for improvement.
- The home is safe, secure and welcoming for children. The childminder demonstrates through discussion how she will provide daily opportunities for fresh air and exercise.
- The childminder understands the importance of working in partnership with parents. She knows how to gain detailed information to enable her to support children's individual care and learning needs throughout the day.
- The childminder has clear expectations for children's behaviour which are appropriate for different ages of children. She understands how to promote positive behaviour.
- The childminder discusses how she carries out risk assessment procedures of the home and for outings to minimise risks and hazards.
- The childminder knows how to promote children's well-being. She discusses how positive interactions help children to build high levels of confidence and self-esteem.
- The childminder holds a current first-aid qualification.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
