Information about this children's home

This privately operated children's home is currently registered to provide care and accommodation for up to three children and young people.

Inspection date: 11 November 2019

This monitoring visit

The children's home was judged as inadequate at the full inspection on 1 October 2019. At that inspection, serious concerns were apparent in how well the young people were helped and protected. Leaders and managers had failed to provide the young people with the therapeutic environment and support that they reported to offer in their statement of purpose. There had been an increase in admissions to hospital following incidents when the young people had harmed themselves, and the young people's education had been significantly interrupted.

This monitoring visit was undertaken to review the actions that leaders and managers have taken to address the weaknesses.

Since the previous inspection, one of the young people has moved out leaving one young person living in the home. Staff have provided this young person with a period of calm and stability. While there have been a few changes in the staff team, there remains overall a stable staff team that knows the young person well. An improved quality of records evidences the small steps in progress that the young person is making.

Leaders, managers and newly appointed therapists took immediate steps to introduce a collaborative approach to supporting this young person's mental health needs. As a direct result of this consistency, there have been no further admissions into hospital for this young person, attendance at college is 100% and there have been no notifiable incidents.

Staff safely support the young person to attend all necessary health appointments and visit her family for overnight stays during the weekends. This is a significant

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improvement since the previous inspection.

Leaders and managers are working closely with the young person's placing authority in preparing the young person for her pending move. Consequently, the young person is being helped to better understand and manage her feelings about the changes that are due to take place before her 18th birthday in January 2020.

Leaders and managers have taken swift action to address the shortfalls identified at the previous inspection. An action plan outlining the most immediate actions has ensured that staff and young people are safe. Medium and long-term actions are in progress and require further time to embed. As a result, the requirements raised at the previous inspection will remain in place and be reviewed further at the next full inspection.
