Monitoring visit
Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

Information about this children's home

This home is one of a small group run by an independent provider. This home provides care and accommodation for up to four children, irrespective of gender, who may have behavioural and/or emotional difficulties.

The home was closed for 18 months before reopening in July 2019. The new, suitably qualified manager has been registered since 1 July 2019. This is the manager's first registered manager post.

This monitoring visit

This home was closed for 18 months before reopening in July 2019. In October 2019, Ofsted undertook the first full inspection since the home reopened and judged the home as inadequate. Concerns about care practice, safeguarding and the leadership and management of the home led to Ofsted serving a notice of restriction of accommodation and two compliance notices.

The primary purpose of this monitoring visit was to ensure that the provider is complying with the notice restricting accommodation and has met the actions specified in the compliance notices. The home is currently empty. One child moved from the home within a few days of the last inspection and another child moved out four weeks later. No children have been admitted since the last inspection. The provider is complying with the restriction notice.

At the last inspection, concerns regarding staffing numbers, staff deployment and staff's skills and experience were raised. Since the last inspection, no further staff training has taken place. Concerns about the number of appropriately trained and qualified staff have increased since the last inspection. This is because all the staff, except for the manager, have left their employment at the home. The home is therefore not equipped to provide care and support to children.

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Lack of effective risk assessment and helping children to understand risk were identified as an area of concern at the last inspection. Some work has started on improving risk assessments and evidencing some discussion with children about keeping safe when on a planned activity. One risk assessment that was of concern at the last inspection was reviewed at this visit. The manager has updated one child's risk assessment to include important information of relevant risks regarding road safety and antisocial behaviour. However, despite clear indications that a child who was due to move on was going to go missing, including a statement by the child of their intent to go missing, the staff did not develop any strategy or take positive action to prevent this. The child therefore placed themself at potential risk of harm by travelling independently back to their home area, which is a significant distance away from the home. The records of this event are not held in a central and clearly accessible place and a record of a telephone call made to the manager by the child is not documented. Poor recording of significant events impedes effective monitoring and limits the provider's ability to ensure that the children receive effective and responsive care.

The home continues to require redecorating to provide children with a homely and nurturing environment. Spillage damage can be seen on the kitchen wall, the bathroom window is broken, paintwork is flaking off, radiator covers require repairs, there are many bare hooks in the lounge where pictures used to hang and the children's bedrooms require furniture.

The manager has reflected on safeguarding situations and is able to identify what she would now do if she had concerns regarding a member of staff. However, she has not undertaken sufficient training and professional development to improve her knowledge and skills. As a result, she was not able to demonstrate that she has the skills and experience to manage the home effectively.

Internal monitoring of the home is ineffective. The manager has begun to introduce some monitoring tools for incidents. However, these did not identify the shortfalls in recording as noted at the last inspection.

This is the manager's first registered manager post. The provider has not ensured that the manager has received effective supervision, support and challenge.

Organisational monitoring arrangements are poor. The home has had only two independent visits, rather than the required minimum of four, since reopening the home in July 2019. Both visits were announced, therefore staff had time to prepare for the visit. These visits lacked rigour. The visit reports failed to give an insight into the standard of safeguarding and the quality of care. The report of the most recent visit, which was carried out after Ofsted had judged the home as inadequate and taken enforcement action, does not give any sense that the visitor was aware of these concerns.

Many requirements from the last full inspection are restated. This is because they



are not met or are matters which were not reviewed as part of this inspection.

The leadership and management of the home are poor. Consequently, the actions set out in the compliance notice relating to leadership and management are not met. The manager and responsible individual have not demonstrated sufficient evidence of improvement or capacity to drive future improvement. The restriction of accommodation remains in place and is subject to ongoing monitoring. Ofsted is considering its next steps in relation to the provider's failure to meet the actions in this compliance notice.

Progress has been made to address the safety of the building. The open gas cupboard has been secured. The radiators are now working and are secured to the wall. The fire door to the kitchen has been repaired and the fire doors are kept closed. The local fire officers have visited, and although they made suggestions for improvement, indicated that they are satisfied with the fire management arrangements.

The manager has updated the location risk assessment to reflect the dangers of the road and strained relationships with local residents.

Although the provider has met some of the actions in the compliance notice relating to the protection of children, a number of actions remain unmet or could not be evidenced by the provider. These aspects have been raised as requirements at this monitoring visit.

Ofsted will continue to monitor the home.
