What is it like to attend this early years setting?

The provision is inadequate

The quality of teaching is weak. Staff do not use or adapt activities to meet children's individual developmental needs. As a result, children are not making good progress. Staff fail to challenge and build on older children's learning to help them fulfil their potential. In the absence of a permanent special educational needs coordinator (SENCo), staff are not supported well enough to meet children's additional needs. As a result, some children make poor progress in their communication and language development.

Staff prevent children from making their own choices and leading their own play. This poor interaction restricts children's interests and motivation to learn, and their all-round development. Most children arrive happy and keen to attend. They make friends and learn how to share and play kindly. New children benefit from caring staff who provide them with comfort and reassurance to help them settle in and feel safe.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- The manager and leaders do not ensure requirements are met in the event of staff changes. There is no named deputy appointed to take charge in the manager's absence and arrangements for a temporary SENCo are not sufficient to identify and meet children's additional needs. This has a significant impact on some children, who make limited progress in their communication and language development.
- The manager and leaders provide staff with insufficient support to improve the quality of their teaching. As a result, staff do not understand how to support children's learning and do not help them to make good progress in all areas.
- The manager and staff have introduced new systems to assess and plan children's learning. However, they do not have high enough expectations of what children can achieve and do not challenge older children sufficiently. For example, staff ask older children simple mathematical questions in areas in which they are already competent and they do not help children to extend their vocabulary further.
- Staff do not make good use of activities and children's choices to support their all-round development and motivation to learn. For example, staff discourage children unnecessarily from playing with the physical play equipment, sandpit and painting activities they repeatedly try to use. These children become upset and frustrated and this restricts their learning.
- he manager and leaders have addressed some of the weaknesses from the previous inspection. For example, they have improved the organisation of the activities. Children are not kept waiting unnecessarily during changes in routine, such as after meals. Staff have attended training in managing children's



behaviour. They have developed strategies to manage unwelcome behaviour, such as biting.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are not effective.

The setting has appointed a temporary designated safeguarding lead. However, she has not attended child protection training that meets the minimum requirements of the Local Safeguarding Children Board. She does not have the required level of knowledge regarding broader child protection issues and the risks to children, or current good practice. Otherwise, staff understand the risks to children and the correct procedures to follow if they have any concerns about a child. The management team follows recruitment procedures to ensure new staff and volunteers are suitable to work with children. New staff undertake an induction to help prepare them for their role.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

The provision is inadequate and Ofsted intends to take enforcement action.

Crossways Playgroup registered in 1993. It operates from Crossways, near Dorchester, Dorset. The committee-run playgroup operates term time only on Mondays and Thursdays from 9am to 3pm, on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 9am until 1pm, and on Fridays from 9am to midday. The pre-school receives funding for the provision of free early years education for children aged three and four years. The committee employs three members of staff, two of whom hold early years qualifications at level 3. They are supported by a volunteer.
