The home is run by a private organisation and is registered to provide care and accommodation for up to three children or young people who have emotional and/or behavioural difficulties.

The manager has been registered with Ofsted since 2018.

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This inspection

The effectiveness of the home and the progress and experiences of children and young people since the most recent full inspection

This home was judged requires improvement to be good at the last full inspection. At the interim inspection, Ofsted judges that it has sustained effectiveness.

This inspection was brought forward to address specific concerns received by Ofsted.

Children are safe and making progress from their starting points. Two children have moved out of the home since the last inspection. Children's views are sought before any move and this helps them to feel listened to and gain an understanding of how they can influence the decision-making in their lives.

Admissions to the home are well planned. However, risk assessments do not sufficiently identify all known areas of risk. To date, this has not resulted in any harm to children or young people, but risk assessments require improvement to ensure that planning around transitions is thorough.

Children and young people either attend school or have educational activities provided by staff while they are waiting for an educational placement. There is a reward scheme in place to encourage and promote participation in education. For those children and young people with education placements, attendance is good and they are making progress. One young person has achieved a period of paid employment, which is clear progress from their starting point. This helps promote positive self-esteem.

Children and young people are safe. When safeguarding concerns or incidents occur, the manager ensures that other professionals are informed and included in decision-making. However, such incidents are not always notified to Ofsted. This does not result in further harm but means the regulator is not able to monitor safeguarding practice to ensure that all relevant steps are taken to safeguard children and young people.

Behaviour is well managed in the home and children and young people are engaged in a range of activities in their leisure time. Routines are quickly established so that children and young people can become familiar with the rules of the home. This consistency enables children and young people to learn the boundaries of their behaviour, which helps them to feel safe.

Sanctions are used to help children and young people learn to regulate their own behaviour and are well recorded. The manager's oversight of these records does not always include an evaluation of whether this practice has been effective. This means that sanctions are used to address behaviours in the short term rather than as learning opportunities that are beneficial to children and young people.



Children and young people's views have helped to improve some areas of the home. The manager has a plan of the areas that require repair or redecoration, but this does not prioritise any work in the bedrooms of children and young people. This is a missed opportunity to show children and young people that they are valued.

The manager has implemented auditing processes so that she can monitor and review all documents and records. When she identifies areas of weakness, she uses this information to challenge her team's practice, raising the standard of care that children and young people receive. This helps children and young people make progress.
