What is it like to attend this early years setting?

The provision is good

Children and babies thrive in the nursery. They are happy and safe and feel secure. Staff create a warm and welcoming environment with a family atmosphere. They are kind and nurturing and get to know the children very well. Children develop close bonds with staff and with their friends. This contributes positively to children's overall well-being and their good behaviour.

The manager and staff have high expectations for all children. Children make good progress. Staff ensure the rooms and outdoor areas are thoughtfully planned to stimulate children's curiosity and imagination. Children show good levels of confidence and independence as they move around the nursery and lead their own play. Babies and children develop their communication skills well. Staff are attentive and communicate well with children in a variety of ways. For example, as they play alongside children, they model language, repeat key words and use exciting resources.

Staff take time to work with parents to find out about babies' and children's care needs and what they can do on entry. Staff encourage parents to let them know about their children's learning at home. For example, parents add their observations to the designated display board showing things they are proud their children have accomplished.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- Staff are very attentive to children's care needs. They respond promptly when children need changing or comforting. The environment is well organised. It enables children from a young age to freely select toys and resources. The attractive furniture in the baby room is carefully placed. For example, it is just at the right height for babies to steady themselves as they learn to walk. Well-planned routines support children's growing independence. For example, at mealtimes, older babies proudly use spoons to feed themselves, while pre-school children take some responsibility for serving their own food.
- Children make good progress. They relish exploring and discovering. For instance, toddlers enjoy adding water to sand or soil to explore different textures. Older children enjoy solving problems, such as finding out how much water is needed to sink a toy boat. Staff support children well in building their language and communication skills. For example, they ask questions and encourage the good development of children's vocabulary. They hold conversations with children as they play and introduce new words. Staff complete regular assessments and check children's achievements. Leaders monitor systems to enable consistent practice throughout the setting. Staff confidently explain how they will help children to meet their next steps in



learning. They regularly share and review this information with parents. Partnerships with parents are strong.

- Children of all ages enjoy listening to stories and handle books with care. Younger children relish making marks with chalk and paint. Older children use coloured pens and pencils to make marks which are meaningful to them and they can write their names. Staff promote children's physical abilities well, overall. Children have good opportunities for daily outdoors play. They practise skills of balance and coordination, for instance when using scooters and tricycles. Younger children have good opportunities for clambering, climbing and sliding. However, staff do not focus strongly enough on encouraging the older and more physically able children to fully extend their climbing or balancing skills as the equipment is too small.
- Children behave well. They are keen to learn and enjoy being given responsibility for tasks. For example, older children accompany staff to make risk assessments of their outdoor area to make sure it is without hazards. Staff encourage younger children to consider that toys left on the floor could be trip hazards. Children often tidy their toys away without being prompted before playing with something else.
- Leadership is good. The manager has high standards for the provision and the care provided. Staff benefit from regular supervision meetings and peer observations. They regularly access training targeted to support the welfare needs of children. However, management do not fully explore additional opportunities to help staff build further on their knowledge and skills, to raise the quality of teaching further.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective.

Leaders and staff have a secure knowledge and understanding of how to keep children safe. Leaders ensure staff access regular safeguarding training to keep their knowledge up to date. They have a secure knowledge of the signs and symptoms of abuse and neglect. Additionally, staff know the procedures to follow if they have concerns about a member of staff. Leaders have good knowledge of safe recruitment guidelines. They implement a robust recruitment procedure, induction and supervision process to ensure staff are suitable to work with children. Leaders and staff vigilantly carry out risk assessments to ensure that risks to children are minimised.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

To further improve the quality of the early years provision, the provider should:

consider ways to focus more precisely on the professional development of staff, to raise the quality of their teaching further



provide the older and most able children with further opportunities to develop their climbing and balancing skills.
