This privately owned children's home provides care for up to four children who have complex needs and require specialist support. The manager has been registered with Ofsted since July 2019.

The effectiveness of the home and the progress and experiences of children and young people since the most recent full inspection

This home was judged good at the last full inspection. At the interim inspection, Ofsted judges that it has sustained effectiveness.

At the last inspection, three requirements and three recommendations were raised. The manager has addressed one of these requirements and all the recommendations. Two of the requirements have been reset and one further requirement has been set at this inspection.

The children's individual records have improved. The records are up to date and provide important information. However, some handwritten records in the daily log and of individual sessions undertaken with the children are at times illegible. These records may make it difficult for the children to read information about themselves now or in the future.

The independent visitor's reports of the last two visits have not been sent to Ofsted. This shortfall means that Ofsted does not have a recent overview of the home.

The manager has not fully met the further two requirements. The staff now challenge a child about smoking in their bedroom and implement the strategies in the risk assessments. However, despite these strategies, the child continues to smoke in their room. Although the number of instances has reduced, smoking in the home is unsafe and places the children and the staff at risk. Also, not all the children's risk assessments provide enough detail of the actual risk or clear actions to reduce the risk.

One member of staff has attended training in attachment theory. However, due to timescales since the last inspection, the staff team is yet to receive this training and other specific identified training such as managing substance misuse. This shortfall means that not all staff have the required skills to meet the needs of the children.

Since the last inspection, one child has left the home. This child moved in a planned and positive way. The staff continue to provide support and make visits to the child at their new home.

The children continue to make improvements in all areas of their lives. They engage in their education provisions and work placements. The staff help the children to overcome barriers that previously restricted them. The staff motivate and support the children to achieve. They praise the children's accomplishments and develop strong relationships with them.

The manager has made improvements to the home. The staffing is stable, with new staff joining the team. Good induction and a focus on the staff's personal



development have resulted in a consistent and dedicated staff team that meets the children's needs well.

The staff build and maintain good relationships with the children. The staff spend quality time with the children and are committed to their care. The staff make sure that the children live in an environment that is clean, homely and welcoming.

The manager and staff work well with placing authorities. A social worker said, 'Communication has always been good and beneficial. The staff are good at informing me of any incidents and changes that might affect the young person I work with.'
