What is it like to attend this early years setting?

The provision is outstanding

Children thrive in the welcoming and highly stimulating environment. They show great enthusiasm as they participate in the wide range of freely accessible activities. The childminder knows the children exceptionally well, and talks to them about their home lives with interest. She plans and provides activities that reflect children's interests and challenges their learning. For example, as they play with dough, children identify shapes, colours and repeating patterns. The childminder extends their interest by talking about how to make new colours.

The childminder creates a vast range of opportunities for children to learn through a wealth of high-quality resources and interactions. For example, children develop their physical skills by threading cogs onto shoelaces. While younger children demonstrate an excellent understanding of how to use simple technological equipment with buttons and switches, older children develop fine motor skills through activities such as completing jigsaws and lock and key puzzles.

The childminder has high expectations of the children and the development that they make. All children, including those with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), are well prepared for the next stages in their lives. The childminder encourages children to tidy up, wash their own hands and find their own coats and shoes in order to promote their independence. They understand the clear explanations and instructions the childminder gives them. The childminder promotes positive relationships and interactions. Children are kind, polite and learn to share and take turns.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- The childminder's sensitive approach nurtures children and enables them to learn what is right and wrong. For example, she uses open communication with children and makes suggestions to help them understand how to cooperate with others.
- Children make exceptional progress from on their starting points. Through accurate monitoring, the childminder provides the best support for children's progress. For example, children who require support with their speech and language development are encouraged to blow bubbles and use mirrors to look at the shapes their faces are making. This helps them develop the facial muscles to form letter sounds more effectively.
- The childminder uses outstanding interaction, narrative and questioning to build on children's learning and language. For example, she clearly explains what is happening with activities and supports children to lead their play and use their imagination. Children engage with the childminder as she reads the story of 'The Snail and the Whale'. They listen exceptionally well and join in with the repeated



refrains and rhyming words.

- The childminder works exceptionally hard to share her expertise with others. For example, she attends childminding playgroups and is developing excellent partnerships with other settings that children attend. As a result, children have smooth transitions into the next stages of their learning.
- Children are confident in communicating with adults and with each other. They confidently make up their own role play and sing songs, demonstrating a wide understanding and use of vocabulary.
- Children learn about how they need to adjust their behaviour to ensure they and their friends stay happy and safe. For example, they use resources responsibly and actively help to tidy up after themselves.
- The childminder gets to know the children and their families before they start. For instance, she provides them with well-planned settling-in sessions and a comprehensive welcome pack.
- The childminder frequently praises children, which helps to support their selfesteem. She has the skills to know when to support children and when to stand back to allow them to gain independence and achieve for themselves.
- The childminder is highly skilled at teaching the children about personal hygiene and how to keep healthy. For example, they take turns to pump soap onto their hands to ensure they are washed clean before they eat, and discuss healthy eating habits.
- The childminder reflects exceptionally well on her practice. For example, she has detailed plans in place to improve the children's outdoor learning by growing more vegetables that the children can use in their baking.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective.

The childminder has a deep and broad understanding of safeguarding policies and procedures. Her excellent understanding helps to ensure children are safe and supported well at all times. The childminder attends regular child protection training to ensure her knowledge is accurate and up to date. The childminder completes thorough checks on her home to ensure the environment is safe and secure. She also encourages children to consider how they play, to ensure they keep themselves and their friends safe.

Inspection activities

- The inspector checked documentation showing how the childminder works in partnership with parents, her public liability insurance and training certificates.
- The inspector spoke with the childminder throughout the inspection to establish her understanding of how to safeguard children.
