Information about this children's home

This children's home is owned by a private company. It is registered to provide care and accommodation for up to four young people aged between eight and 17 years old who have social and emotional needs.

The home has been without a registered manager since August 2019.

This inspection

The effectiveness of the home and the progress and experiences of children and young people since the most recent full inspection

This home was judged requires improvement to be good at the last full inspection.

At the interim inspection, Ofsted judges that it has sustained effectiveness.

Three young people currently live in the home. Since the last inspection, one young person has moved out. Staff worked extremely hard to ensure that this was a well-planned and a child-focused move. This attention to detail ensured that the young person experienced a positive transition.

At the last inspection, six requirements were raised. At this inspection, four of these requirements are met.

Managers have updated young people's risk assessments to ensure that the documents are current and accurate. A new system is in place to make sure that all staff know and understand the contents of young people's risk assessments.

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Staff have made improvements to the arrangements for individual work with young people. Staff now plan and carry out targeted work in accordance with young people's individual care plans and needs. As a result, young people increase their understanding of the impact of their behaviour and improve their knowledge of issues such as personal safety and promoting their health.

Staff support young people in developing their life skills in readiness for adulthood. This independence work is linked to young people's individual pathway plans. Work is not limited to practical skills such as cooking or budgeting. Staff also carry out work to help young people understand the realities of living alone. This bespoke work helps to improve young people's resilience as they move to adulthood. As a result, young people are well prepared for their future.

There has been one incident that needed to be notified to Ofsted since the last inspection. Managers ensured that it was reported in line with regulations.

Despite this good progress, there remain shortfalls in the management oversight of the home. The home has been without a registered manager since August 2019 and a new manager is yet to be appointed. Management support has been provided by senior managers. However, this has not secured consistency and has resulted in some areas of potential poor practice being overlooked. For example, an incident that questioned a member of staff's decision-making was picked up only when it was identified by the inspector. This represents a missed opportunity to review and improve the standards of care.

Managers still do not give sufficient attention to the safe recruitment of new staff. There is a lack of professional curiosity about contradictory information arising from recruitment checks. This means that inconsistencies in the information received are not identified and/or followed up before new staff come to work in the home.

Managers have improved their monitoring of staff training. In addition, staff now receive training in response to new and emerging risks in the home. However, managers have not demonstrated clear expectations of the training requirements of agency staff. As a result, some agency staff have come to work in the home without having received training in how to safeguard young people.

Managers have carried out work to improve the standards of record-keeping in the home. This work remains ongoing at the time of this inspection, and managers recognise it as an area for further development.

There are no new requirements raised as a result of this inspection.
