What is it like to attend this early years setting?

The provision is inadequate

Children's safety is not assured in the setting and this continues to be a concern. Although managers state that there are procedures in place to keep children safe, staff do not always follow these. Children do not get always get the attention they need due to poor deployment and organisation of staff. At these times, children lack direction and do not engage in meaningful play. Teaching is often weak and staff do not always have high expectations for children. Consequently, children are not supported to make the best progress possible and become well prepared for school. Not all staff are confident about how to plan for children's learning and how to monitor their progress. Activities do not always challenge or extend children's capacity to learn, particularly for the oldest children. For example, group times are uninspiring, and children quickly become bored and disinterested. This has a negative impact on their behaviour and they do not listen to staff or engage in the activity.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- There are significant hazards in the nursery. There has been previous non-compliance with the requirement to ensure children are not exposed to risks. Medication is stored in a low-level, unlocked fridge in a corridor used by children. Cleaning detergent used to wash tables is left within easy reach of children. Some staff keep their handbags in low cupboards in the playroom. Managers are unaware of this practice. Steps are not taken to check that these handbags do not have dangerous items in them. Effective procedures are in place to ensure that staff do not take mobile phones into the nursery areas.
- The deputy manager undertakes supervision sessions with childcare staff. However, this is a relatively new procedure and not yet fully embedded to bring about the improvement needed. Steps are not taken to identify and address weak practice. There is no established, effective system of ongoing supervision and support for the manager herself.
- The setting receives regular advice and support from the local authority advisers. Despite this, there are still ongoing concerns about safety and the quality of the teaching and learning. This demonstrates a poor capacity to improve the nursery.
- On the day of the inspection, enough staff were in the building to meet the required ratios. However, staff are often distracted by domestic tasks instead of engaging with the children. Managers also report that they are routinely needed to work directly with the children. As a result, they are unable to focus on organising and supervising staff, ensuring the setting's procedures are followed.
- Lunchtime for the older children does not promote their independence. It also does not prepare them fully for what will be expected of them when they start school. Food is already plated and placed on the table before children sit down.



There are no clear expectations for them to follow a routine at this time.

- Managers say they are working hard to improve the environment. They are currently replacing resources. However, the nursery building is in need of redecoration. Some areas do not look particularly inviting and stimulating for children.
- Parents spoken to on the day of the inspection say that their children are happy to come to nursery. They speak positively about the information they get about children's general care throughout the day. They say staff are friendly. Some efforts are made to engage parents in their child's learning and to support them in continuing this at home. However, staff state this is not always successful.
- Interactions between staff and the youngest children are warm and caring. Babies approach staff confidently and appear settled in their care. They explore the environment and delight in squishing the sand between their fingers. They crawl into the book area and help themselves to books. Staff encourage their speech development through talking and singing.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are not effective.

Breaches to the safeguarding and welfare requirements compromise children's safety and welfare. During the inspection, the inspector identified risks to children's safety. The managers and staff have a clear understanding of what to do if they have a concern about a child's welfare or the behaviour of a member of staff. Managers follow safe recruitment processes to ensure that staff are and remain suitable to work with children.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

The provision is inadequate and Ofsted intends to take enforcement action.

Sessions are from 7am until 6pm. The nursery provides funded early education for two-, three- and four-year-old children.
