This inspection

The effectiveness of the home and the progress and experiences of children and young people since the most recent full inspection

This home was judged good at the last full inspection. At the interim inspection, Ofsted judges that it has sustained effectiveness.

All young people are helped to access education. As a result of the bespoke work carried out by the staff, young people who have previously refused to go to school are now regularly attending school. The manager is quick to escalate concerns if he feels that young people are not getting the right educational support. Consequently, young people are achieving academic success.

Staff manage young people's vulnerabilities well by bringing in strategies that help to keep young people safe.

Young people told the inspector that they were happy at the home. They benefit from having good relationships with the staff and said that they would rate the home 10 out of 10.

Staff have helped one young person to successfully move into her own accommodation. The young person has a full-time job and has high aspirations for her future. The young person told the inspector: 'I've been in a lot of children's homes, but never one as good as this. Staff do not give up on young people here.'

Despite the many positive features, there have been a couple of occasions when staff practice has fallen short of the required standard. For example, on one occasion, weaknesses in practice led to a young person's placement being ended by their placing local authority. The management team has ensured that a thorough investigation has been carried out, and that lessons have been learned.

Some record-keeping requires improvement. This includes the recording of key-work sessions. The organisation is in the early stages of implementing a new electronic system that is anticipated to address this shortfall.



What does the children's home need to do to improve?

Recommendations

- Staff should be familiar with the home's policies on record keeping and understand the importance of careful, objective, and clear recording. Staff should record information on individual children in a non-stigmatising way that distinguishes between fact, opinion and third-party information. Information about the child must always be recorded in a way that will be helpful to the child. ('Guide to the children's homes regulations including the quality standards', page 62, paragraph 14.4)
- Some records may be kept electronically (regulation 38), provided that this information can be easily accessed by anyone with a legitimate need to view it and, if required, be reproduced in a legible form. Electronic records should be held at the individual home in accordance with data protection principles. IT systems should ensure the safe storage of these records and business continuity planning should be in place to prevent loss or damage to them. ('Guide to the children's homes regulations including the quality standards', page 61, paragraph 14.2)
